The Reform Demonstration at Seaford.

The Reform demonstration held at Seaford on Wednesday was in every respect a grand success. Not fewer than two thousand of the substantial and true Reformers of the Counties of Perth and Huron assembled to listen to their political leaders. At eleven o'clock a procession, headed by the fine band of the Grand Trunk Railway; formed at the station and proceeded to the grounds. After the speakers had partaken of lunch the chair was taken by Mr. J. S. Sinclair, of Goderich. Speeches were delivered by Mr. Horton, M. P. for Centre Huron, Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, Joseph Bymal, M. The address delivered by Mr. Mackenzie was one of his most able efforts, was pregnant with truth, and carried conviction to every unprejudiced hearer. Mr. Bymal, as usual, delivered an address overflowing with wit, well seasoned with good, sound, common sense. Mr. Young fully sustained the reputation he has earned as being a fluent and earnest advocate of Reform principles. Mr. Patterson consulted the audience with his ready and original witticisms; in fact Mr. Patterson bids fair to rival Honest Joe as a humorous speaker. The other speakers also sustained their parts well. At the conclusion of the speaking three cheers were given for each, and three for the safe return of the Hon. Mr. Blake. A complimentary supper was held at Murray's Hotel in the evening, at which a large number of the prominent Reformers of the counties were present. Interesting speeches were delivered, in response to toasts, by the gentlemen who had spoken in the afternoon and by others as well. Altogether, the evening was agreeably spent, and the day's proceedings will long be remembered and talked of by the Reformers of the counties of Huron and Perth.
