—At the monthly meeting of St. George's Society held last evening two annual members were elected.

—Richard Howlett, of South London, was remanded by Police Magistrate Parke this morning for a week, on a charge of insanity, preferred by his wife.

—Mr. Edward Wallace, of the Advertiser news room, has returned to the city after spending a couple of months very pleasantly in the old country.

—Workmen were busily engaged to-day in raising the Pall Mall street railway track to the same level as the C. P. R. road-bed at the West End street crossing.

—The institution of the new Sons of Canada lodge in London West, which was to have taken place last evening, has been postponed until Thursday evening next.

—The start for Godefrich of the Forest City Bicycle Club from Victoria Park at 2:30 to-morrow afternoon will be worth witnessing. From 20 to 25 riders will participate.

—Mr. H. J. Hill, the energetic manager of the Toronto Industrial Fair, was in the city to-day. He reports most encouraging prospects for the success of Toronto's fair next month.

—Trustee Rowlands does not wish to be placed on record as voting to exclude the press representatives from Wednesday's committee meeting, and says he did not vote that way.

—J. Wolf was charged by J. Goldner at the Police Court this morning with using threatening language. The Magistrate advised the parties to settle the matter between themselves and dismissed the case.

For the convenience of the citizens the G. T. R. will run a special to Port Stanley at 10:30 p. m. Saturday, Aug. 16, for accommodation of those desiring to go there and remain until evening of civic holiday.

—If School Board business continues as it has the past two nights, said Trustee Cook last night as he looked at the clock and smiled, "we will have to bring our beds along with us and have our meals brought in."

—The evidence on the Woods' charges will be classified and a recommendation in the matter made by No. 1 Committee to the School Board on Tuesday evening next. It had been intended to meet Monday, but that is the city's annual holiday.

—The position of meteorological observer for London, recently held by Mr. E. B. Reed, has been filled by the selection of Mr. John S. Dewar. Mr. Dewar is to be congratulated on his appointment. We will now know who to hold responsible for the weather hereabouts!

—Edith Sharp, a young woman, appeared before Magistrate Parke this morning on a charge of insanity. She was a quiet, harmless-looking creature, but betrayed a lack of understanding in her pale, expressionless face. After hearing the evidence the Magistrate remanded her to jail until Wednesday.

—John Foley, James Logan, James Crowley, Daniel McIntyre, John Grimes and Leslie Whittle formed the inebriate corps at the Police Court this morning. The first mentioned was fined \$2, Crowley and McIntyre were assessed \$1 and the others were allowed to go with the customary warning.

—"Port Stanley's popularity this season has exceeded everyone's expectations," said

a New Orchard Beschite. "Next year (when that special train for the accommodation of residents is to be put on by the G. T. R.) there will be such a rush of people for residences there that it will astonish the whole country."

—A number of improvements have lately been made at the Western Fair Grounds, including the shifting of several of the smaller buildings in order to give the machinery hall more prominence than heretofore. The main building will have power introduced, and the many manufactures there going on throughout the Fair will form an especially attractive feature.

Entries are already numerous. W. W. Atwood and F. N. ReQua, of Chicago, arrived at the Tecumseh yesterday from Rochester. They started from Chicago two weeks ago with bicycles, making a total of one thousand miles to London. This morning at 9 a.m. they made their return start direct for Chicago. They speak highly of London and the treatment they received here. They purpose making a similar tour next summer, and will bring a few more wheelmen with them.

—Alfred Brown, Frank Brown, Fred Stone and a lad named Brennan had their names entered on the Police Court blotter this morning opposite a charge of trespass. The complainant was Herman Brock, who lives in the northern part of the city. He stated that the boys were a nuisance to him in his house, frequently trespassing upon his property. The Magistrate advised him to see the boys' parents and not to bring so trivial a matter into court. The boys were discharged.

The Rome correspondent of the American Catholic News (New York) writes that the Pope has been pleased to confirm the decree of the sacred congregation of propaganda, nominating Rev. Denis O'Connor, superior of the College of the Assumption and St. Basil, Bishop of the See of London.

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land, but that was no reason for Canadians saying there was no use trying to wrest it from them. Merchants could soon know the exact cost of sending anything from London direct to Jamaica. Of course there was no practical banking system in the islands, and he would have to procure the rates of exchange and information on other financial matters. When applications were made for space in the buildings all necessary forms would be sent to the applicant. The instructions were so clear that there could be no possible mistake whatever in any shipment which would be made to those business firms either at St. John's or Halifax, who would undertake the gathering of the goods together and keeping them for the time being until the Government would pay all freightage they would not be responsible for insuring packing, loss by fire, etc., or neglect to take out an insurance policy. Another thing which he might mention was the large demand for pressed hay and a large trade might result therefrom. As regards the time limited for entries, he would say that the date on the circular, July 1, was misleading, as it meant that the applications for space should be in by that time. Applications might be made up till Sept. 30 from Canadian exhibitors. In conclusion Mr. Brown said he would reply to any questions which might be asked him.

On being requested to state something as to duties on flour imports, he replied that at any rate they would be the same as on American goods, and thus enable the Canadians to compete on equal terms.

In answer to Mr. Wolfe he said he intended visiting Jamaica before the exhibition and ascertaining other matters. Mr. Brown said that he understood that West Indian business had been conducted principally through brokers in New York and Boston. He had written direct to the secretary of the exhibition, receiving several letters in reply, and he saw no reason why trade between the two countries should not be facilitated.

Mr. John Campbell said he wished to move a vote of thanks to Mr. Brown for his interesting address. He thought Canadians should compete with Americans in the foreign markets, but they should find out what their foreign customers really needed and refrain from sending things not required.

Mayor Taylor in seconding the motion, said that they were deeply indebted to Mr. Brown for the concise form in which he had laid the information before them. There was no reason why Canadians should not participate in the trade to the West Indies. He was surprised to hear that the inhabitants there regarded Canadian flour as damp, and the only way to disprove such an idea was to send an exhibit which would show them that this country produced as fine flour as any in the world. He had great pleasure in seconding the motion.

The President heartily and briefly thanked the speakers of the meeting to Mr. Brown for his lucid explanation which would, no doubt, result in some practical effects.

Mr. Brown replied in a few words and hoped to see London represented at the exhibition. He had noticed during his brief stay in the city the many signs of progress and industry among the factories.

The speaker then handed around the printed statistics of West Indian trade and a prospectus of the exhibition and bade the meeting good night after announcing that application blanks could be procured from the secretary, Mr. Nelles.
