THE WEATHER PROPHET.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 1—11 p.m.—Very little
change has occurred in the distribution of
pressure since yesterday. It continues high
from the lakes eastward and in the extreme
Northwest, and the depression still hovers over
Manitoba and Dakota. Cold weather with
rain and snow now prevails from Manitoba to
the Rockies, and the pleasant weather from
Ontario to the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Storm
signals are displayed on Lake Superior.
Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Prince Albert, 22°-34°; Swift Current, 28°-35°;
Qu'Appelle, 32°-34°; Winnipeg, 46°-54°; To-
ronto, 44°-52°; Montreal, 45°-64°; Quebec, 37°-
49°; Halifax, 40°-46°.
Local temperatures—Highest, 68°; lowest, 54°.

Toronto, Oct. 2—1 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region
covering the peninsula and as far east as
Belleville are: Fresh to strong east to south
winds; fair, cool weather.

—George Allen, city, is in Aymer visit-
ing friends.

—Rev. Mr. Boyd has been invited to
preach the anniversary sermons in the
Central Methodist Church, St. Thomas, on
Nov. 8.

—Dr. Hodge, city, has sold his front
street property in Mitchell to John Broder-
ick and Dr. Wood, of that town.

—The Hospital Trust was called to meet
Wednesday afternoon, but there was no
quorum. In future the meeting will be
held every other Wednesday afternoon at
3 o'clock, at the Hospital and City Hall
alternately.

—Champion cyclists from all parts of
Canada are coming to the P. C. E. C. big
meeting on Oct. 8 in Queen's Park. A

Ont., where her mother lives. Mrs. Scott

butcher, deserted her nearly eight months
ago, and has been living with another
woman. A day or two ago he left the city.
She has been living at 216 Macomb street,

Shields Now in Order.
The conditions of warfare have been so
radically changed by smokeless powder and
magazine rifles, effective at a mile and a
half, that European governments are seek-
ing for services that will afford protection
to soldiers. Austria and France are ex-
perimenting with shields for this purpose. A
committee of the French War Office have
reported in favor of a buckler of aluminum
and copper. They think that a shield could
be made of this combination light enough
enough to be carried without serious diffi-
culty, and strong enough to stop even the
moderate rifle bullet, except at very close
quarters. A military gentleman in this
city has for several years past been in pos-
session of a patent for a shield similar to
that which is now being looked for by the
European nations.

Chong Lee in Court.
Chong Lee, an intelligent Chinaman, had
Fred Spurgeon before the police magistrate
yesterday on a charge of assault. Chong
kissed the book and told the court that he
was walking on King street Sunday
when a celestial, whom he knew as a
small man—William Kirk—came up
and asked him for his washing.
It being the Sabbath he informed Kirk
that he could not do it. Kirk then struck
him on the forehead, and Chong Lee where-
upon Spurgeon rushed up and gave him
(Chong) a blow in the face. Mr. Wm.
Gurd, of King street, saw the affair and
confronted the celestial's evidence.
Spurgeon stated that his only desire was to
separate his companion Kirk from the
Chinaman and prevent a row. He merely
pushed Lee away. The magistrate imposed
a fine of \$5.

Medical Men at Work.
Two flags floated gaily over the medical
department of the Western University
yesterday to mark the opening of the
session of 1931-32. There were a fair
number of students present for the open-
ing, but the "freshmen" arrived too
late to be initiated. The dissecting room
contains twelve or fifteen bodies in a splen-
did state of preservation for analysis. The
prospects of the Medical College are excel-
lent for the current term. A strong class
of fourth-year students is enlisted, as is
also the case in the other grades. Students
at this college have unsurpassed facilities
for practical work at the hospital, the
asylum and the numerous charitable insti-
tutions throughout the city. About 30 new
men and 45 of last year's will be in attend-
ance next week. Dr. Wm. Waugh lectured
in the morning from 8 to 9 o'clock on "The
Principles and Practice of Surgery," and
Dr. W. J. Mitchell from 9 to 10 o'clock on
"Anatomy."

A Revolution in Pens.
Though typewriters are now much used,
the large proportion of us must still keep to
the pen and pencil. Everything new, that
is good, in either pens or pencils, is there-
fore of general interest. The latest notable
invention is the centric pen. It has come
to stay, and is sure to be immensely popu-
lar, supplying as it does an instrument
which will write with the rapidity and ease
of a pencil. It differs from the ordinary or
eccentric pen in having a flat head fitted
to a centrally-slotted holder. This brings
the pen's point in a line with the central
axis of the holder, thereby freeing it from
every objection which has been urged

quill pen which was the model from which
the steel pen was first fashioned, the latter
would doubtless have been affixed to the
center, from an intuitive perception of the

Tenders Received.
The tender of Wm. Stevely & Son for a
No. 70 Famous hot air furnace for No. 3
fire hall was accepted by No. 3 Committee
Wednesday. The amount was \$175. The
contract for a platform at the south end of
the market house was let to F. J. Reid at
\$84. J. Furdum tendered for \$135. Maurice
Baldwin will supply the public buildings
of the city with coal for the coming winter.
The price was, grate and egg coal, \$5.09
per ton; stove and chestnut, \$5.09; soft,
\$4.10; Briar Hill, \$5. A. D. Cameron and
T. S. Walls also tendered. The market
clerk's report was read and filed. The
report of the license inspector was sub-
mitted and showed receipts of \$1,619.67.
The wood market clerk read his report,
which stated that 20 cents had been
collected. The report was filed. It was
recommended that all petitions for electric
lights be put in the hands of No. 3 Com-
mittee. There were present: Ald. F. J.
Fitzgerald (chairman), Wyatt, Skinner,
Thomas, W. W. Fitzgerald and Secretary
Bell.

A Lucky Accident.
If E. J. Steele, Union, who was so
severely injured under a moving train in
this city last week, and who was unable to
leave the City Hospital yesterday
having had one hand and two
fingers amputated, is able to recover
\$5,833.33 from the insurance companies,
his misfortune will not have been so un-
lucky to him after all. He is insured in the
Provincial Provident Institution, of
St. Thomas, for \$5,000, one-half of
which is payable in case of ac-
cident resulting in incapacitating the
insured from following his usual avocation.
About two weeks ago Mr. Steele also took
out an accident insurance policy in St.
Thomas for \$10,000 in the Hartford, it
being his purpose to travel extensively
during the coming year. The provisions
of this policy are that the insured is not
paid a weekly benefit if injured, but if he
loses both hands or one foot and one hand,
or the sight of both eyes, he is paid the
amount of the policy, or if he loses one
hand, or one foot, he receives one-third of
the amount of the policy, \$3,333.33.

METEOROLOGICAL MATTERS.
**Snow Storm in the Far West—Water-
spout in Arkansas.**
St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 1.—Reports from
the west say it is snowing in Montana
over a large portion of the British posses-
sions. Last evening the temperature was
2° below freezing at Helena. A cold wave
was rapidly moving eastward.

NEVADA, Oct. 1.—First snow of the
season fell in the northern part of this
county to-day.

MASSACHUSETTS, Oct. 1.—A
terrible water-spout occurred near Elizabeth
Tuesday. Cotton and crops were greatly
damaged and at Harris' mill the furnace
and frame were washed away.

Bananas Replace Bread.
LONDON, Oct. 1.—The lack of rye has led
to a singular novelty in Germany in the
way of food. Bananas are actually being
fed in place of bread to the inmates of many
charitable institutions. These bananas
come from the German colonies, where vast
quantities of the fruit are being raised and
shipped to Germany. The price is so low
that even the poorest can indulge in the
tropical fruit, which was once the luxury
of wealth.
