Complimentary Minute Re the Resignation of Rev. M. P. Talling.

Constitution for the Young Peoples' Societies Adopted-Presbytery

The Presbytery of London met in Knox Church, St. Thomas, yesterday at 11 a.m., Rev. J. G. Stuart, moderator, presiding. The minutes of last regular and special meetings were read and confirmed.

Mr. Drummond presented the report of the committee on the printing of minutes of the Presbytery. The cost would not exceed \$35 annually. It was unanimously agreed that, beginning with the new year, the minutes of the Presbytery be printed and furnished to the members, the clerk and Mr. Drummond to be a committee to at-

tend to the matter. The clerk read the minutes prepared by the committee appointed, re the resignation of Mr. Talling. The minute, which was highly complimentary

with.

It shall be the duty of the corresponding secretary to conduct the correspondence with the Presbyterial, and whatever other correspondence may be necessary for the furtherance of the work. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and hold all funds contributed for the objects of the society, and forward the same as directed to the treasurer of the congregation. 6. 
