

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



-Strathroy Age: "While in Strathroy ast week on business Detective Rogers, of Toronto, informed Mayor Cox that a man named Reid, who was the murderer of Jonathan Robinson, of Adelaide, died in the penitentiary not long since. Reid and some one unknown came from Sarnia through Warwick and Adelaide to London, and on this journey committed the murder. When London was reached Reid was taken into custody, confessed to having committed a crime down east, was taken there and sentenced to a term of years in the penitentiary. The confession was made to escape the consequences of the Robinson murder. When confronted with the evidence of his guilt by the detective, and accused of the crime, Reid wilted at once. He was a noted crook. Who his companion at the time of the murder was has never been found out.

Offenses Under the Postoffice Act. Sir A. P. Caron, Postmaster-General, ir circular calls attention to the following sections of the Postoffice Act, 1886, (49 Vic., chapter 35):

Section 93-"Everyone who incloses a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or in a packet of samples or patterns, or in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, or in any mail matter sent by post not being a letter, shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$40 and not less than \$10 in each case."

Section 94-"Everyone who with fraudulent intent removes from any postage stamp any mark which has been made thereon at any postoffice is guilty of a misdemeanor."

Section 108-"Every person who uses or attempts to use in prepayment of postage any postage stamp which has been before used for a like purpose shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$40, and not less than \$10, for every such offense."

Under the above sections several perse cutions have lately been instituted. In one case-of the cleaning of canceled stamps for the purpose of using them again -the culprit was sent to prison for a term of two years; in other cases fines were imposed as provided by law-in no instance less than \$10. It is the intention of the department to prosecute rigorously all persons who may be detected in deliberate attempts to defraud the revenue.
