A QUEER JOURNEY.

How a French-Canadian Went to the World's Fair—1,000 Miles in an Old Punt.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—Yesterday afternoon a strange craft was sighted off the north pier at the fair grounds, and the guard prepared to notify the odd craft that it could not land. When he saw the voyager he relented. The man was a French-Canadian who had come from the backwoods of Upper Ontario, Canada, in the dugout or punt in which he stood. The lake was so rough and the old punt seemed so unseaworthy that he finally allowed the man to land, as it seemed to be the only harbor for the small boat. The man's name is Antoine Brouseau. Although unable to read or write, he heard of the fair and made up his mind to visit it. He found an old leaky punt about fifteen feet long which had been abandoned. He patched it up and decided to use it as his means of transportation. With the aid of favorable winds, a horse blanket and an old wooden paddle he succeeded in reaching Chicago after traveling a distance of something like 1,000 miles. His only companion was his dog Pet. Before he left his northern home he had never seen a railroad or an electric light; had never heard a band of music or the whistle of a steamboat. At one of the points on his way a band of music was playing, and there also he first gazed upon the wonders of electricity. He was so carried away by what he saw and heard that he thought he had reached heaven. He laid in no provisions before starting on his long voyage; but, like the old hunter and trapper that he was, depended entirely upon the resources of nature for his food. Occasionally he would run across some Indians in their canoes, or a company of fishermen, and from them would obtain enough for immediate wants.

A STRANGE MANIA.

Farmer White is Both Laidish and Destructive—Gives Away Fancied Wealth and Tears Down His Barn.

DANBURY, N. Y., Aug. 22.—Wm. Ward White, a well-to-do farmer of this place, has become insane. A few days ago he tore down his barn, and the next day he chopped down two large maple trees that had been planted on the lawn in front of his house by his father many years ago. He said that he was going to tear down his house next week. Yesterday he was taken to the almshouse and placed in the insane ward until he can be taken to the State insane asylum at Middletown.

When placed in custody the poor old man had shaved off his hair, mustache and whiskers on one side. He owns much valuable property and faculties he owes thousands of acres of the best land in this section. One of his vagaries is to refuse all food that is not prepared by his friends, and a short time ago, when placed under restraint for 30 days, refused during that time to touch food and water that was not brought to him by relatives or friends.

He is now trying to starve himself because, he says, his former friends have proved themselves to be his enemies and he cannot trust them. He says there are but four good persons—the Almighty, the Saviour, the Virgin Mary and himself. All others were creatures no better than worms. He says God communicates with the world through the thunder and the voice of a lion, and he thinks himself the lion. He is lavish with his imaginary bank accounts, and daily gives checks for hundreds of thousands of dollars.

High Living His Ruin.

DENVER, Aug. 22.—Leon M. Carrier, aged 25, was arrested here last night after a chase of four months. Up to last May Carrier was a prosperous merchant in Quebec, but through expensive living was led into crime. By means of forged bills of lading he converted 75 carloads of flour to his own use and fled. Altogether he is supposed to have obtained \$200,000.
