BRITISH LOSE 34 MEN. Cape Town, Oct. 26.-The Boers have captured Jacobsdal, southwest of Kimberley, after a stubborn resistance on the part of the garrison, which consisted of a detachment of Cape Town Highlanders. The latter suffered severely, losing 34 out of 52 men.
