Important Resolutions Regarding the Canadian Contingent.

To Be Brought Before the House by Hon. Mr. Fielding-The Hutton-Hughes Incident.

Ottawa, Feb. 7 .- In the house today a lengthy question was asked by Mr. Domville in regard to Major-General Hutton and Lieutenant-Colonel Sam Hughes. The honorable member quoted an interview with the majorgeneral, in which he said that the letters of Lieut.-Col Hughes placed that officer in a most unenviable light, adding: 'Those who have seen the correspondence so far-and all the letters are now before the government-are of the opinion that Col. Hughes could not have been in his right mind when he wrote in the manner he did." Domville asked what steps, if any, the government had taken to ascertain if the interview was correct.

The Minister of iMilitia-The general officer commanding the militia was requested to state if the interview put lished was a correct report of what he said, to which he replied that it was substantially correct, but was not intended for publication.

Mr. Bennett learned that the government had not yet decided upon a policy in regard to the exportation to the United States of saw logs cut on the Indian reserves in Ontario, but the matter was under consideration. Lieut.-Col. Domville introduced a bill to amend the militia act, which, he explained, was designed to change the present act so that we shall not be compelled, whether we like it or not, to appoint an imperial officer to command the militia of Canada. The bill reads that the militia shall be commanded by either a Canadian or an Imperial officer.

A bill by Mr. Ingram to further amend the franchise act was also introduced. Under the statutes of Ontario absence from the province deprives the citizen of his vote. The bill provides that all Canadians who After his fight with McGovern, Ed- have been serving in South Africa shall, upon their return, if only the day before the election, be entitled to vote upon making oath that he has been in service with the colors. Another provision of the bill is that a qualified voter shall not lose his franchise by reason of his having moved from one municipality to another within the federal electoral district.
