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DOWN TO DEATH!

Man and Little Boy Fell Through the Elevator Shaft Together.

New York, June 3.—Wm. Gallagher, 28 years old, a bartender, who lived at 266 York street, Jersey City, went home for lunch, and seeing the 15-months' old son of Wm. O'Keefe playing in the hallway, caught up the child, kissed it, and was tossing it in the air, when he made a misstep, and both he and the child fell down a dumbwaiter shaft, and were almost instantly killed. Gallagher had been married only six months. His wife was waiting for him on the landing, and witnessed the accident. Gallagher

was very fond of the child and always played with him on his return home.

When the accident happened his back was turned to the open dumbwaiter shaft. As he stepped back with a laugh to toss the tot in the air he missed his footing, and fell through the opening, which is about three feet from the floor, and plunged down the shaft with the baby in his arms. They landed on top of the dumbwaiter in the cellar, both striking on their heads and crushing their skulls.

nor of the Australian Commonwealth and Lady Mary Lygon were present. HOT TIME IN THE OLD COUNTRY.

For several days intense heat has prevailed over the continent, accompanied by heavy storms of thunder and hail. In various sections the crops have been destroyed, and many deaths have been caused by lightning.

PRUSSIAN CROP SHORTAGE.

Owing to the bad crop prospects in Prussia, Count Von Buelow, in his capacity of president of the Prussian ministry, has advised the various government departments concerned to prepare for taking suitable measures to provide state aid for the purpose of meeting the situation. The harvest threatens to be a failure over large areas of the monarchy. Prussia's loss on account of crop shortage are estimated by the president of the standing committee of the Prussian Board of Trade and Agriculture, in his report to Count Von Buelow, to be: Wheat, 183,750,000 marks; rye, 103,000,000 marks.

IN MEMORY OF QUEEN VICTORIA.

It is evident that London will profit materially by the various movements for perpetuating the memory of Queen Victoria. The great national memorial in St. James' Park will be a conspicuous addition to the artistic features of the English metropolis, and bring in its train important street improvements, but it by no means stands alone. Kensington has a scheme of its own for the beautification of the western borough, with a work of art reminiscent of her late majesty, and then there is in prospect the construction of a great triumphal arch of bronze in Marylebone. This proposal, which would add to the stateliness of what is already one of the finest parts of central London. The scheme, it is said, has been submitted for approval to the King.

UNEASINESS PREVAILING!

Owing to the Remarkable Scantiness of News From South Africa.

Details of Relief of Zeerust Show That the Town Was Besieged for Several Months—Sensational Story From Standerton.

London, June 3.—The war office is making no effort to allay the public uneasiness occasioned by the scantiness of the news from South Africa. Nothing has yet come through to illuminate the Viakfontein affair, the only dispatch on the subject since the first official announcement being a three line message from Lord Kitchen-er issued this morning giving the names of three additional officers killed.

Details just received of the relief Zeerust Transvaal, May 22, by General Methuen, show the town was besieged practically for several months, and that its food supply was short.

IMPORTANT CAPTURE.

A dispatch from Pretoria announces that the constabulary have captured Abram Malan, son-in-law of the late General Joubert. Malan was an energetic, progressive politician before the war and since it began he had been very active against the British and had filled several important commands, including that of Pietersburg, until the British occupied the place.

MILITARY MEN NOT ANXIOUS.

London, June 3.—It is not probable that the war office is deliberately suppressing dispatches from Gen. Kitchen-er, and that a serious reverse has occurred. Gen. Kitchen-er has told the story of the battle briefly, and is not disposed to magnify the importance of anything connected with the campaign, but cannot withhold the list of casualties. The absence of Mr. Brod-rick may explain the reticence of the officials in Pall Mall. The stronghold of red tape and the details of the battle may not be accessible to the few straggling war correspondents remaining in the field.

There is no anxiety among military men, since the Boers are known to have been finally repulsed, but there is strong suspicion that the British were again

OFF THEIR GUARD,

and that the heavy losses were caused by their being attacked unexpectedly. Delarey's command has been allowed free range of a large district for a long period, while Gen. Kitchen-er has considered it more important to clear other portions of the Transvaal.

Gen. Smith-Dorrien, who has been welcomed home at Berkensstead, reports that while the war may be ended by September, the bulk of the army will be needed in South Africa for twelve months. This

A SENSATIONAL STORY.

London, June 3.—The Sun publishes a sensational story to the effect that General Botha has arrived at Standerton, and is communicating by telegraph with M. Kruger, through the Netherlands Government, appealing to Mr. Kruger to sue for peace. Lord Kitchen-er is said to have given Botha permission to adopt this course. The Sun further hears that 10,000 Zulus have gone on the warpath, owing to Boer raids in Zululand.

MYSTERIOUS MISSION.

Standerton, Transvaal Colony, June 1.—Gen. Tobias Smut and Dewet, secretary to Gen. Louis Botha, arrived here this morning. Their mission is not explained.

PEACE MISSION.

London, June 3, 6 a.m.—War news this morning points to the probability of the renewal of the Boer efforts to secure peace terms. General Smuts,
