# 10,000 PERISH IN SOUTH SEA CYCLONE; HUGE WAVES SWEEP ISLAND COASTS

Society and Tahiti Archipelagos Devastated by Worst Storm Ever Known in Southern Pacific---Wind Rages for Two Days at 120 Miles an Hour.

San Francisco, March 4.- The Evening Post states that 10,000 persons perished during the storm on Tahiti and adjacent islands, several of which, its account says, have disappeared. It places the damage at \$5,000,000.

Papeete, Tahiti, Feb. 16, via San Francisco, March 3 .- The most destructive cyclone ever experienced in the Society and Tuamotu Islands occurred on Feb. 7 and 8. The damage in Tahiti is estimated at \$1,000,000, and presumably a similar amount of property was destroyed on the Tuamotu Islands. The city of Papeete was inundated and about 75 buildings destroyed, including the American con-The shipping in the harbon of Papeete escaped injury, owing to the direction of the wind, but fears we entertained for vessels which were c. uising near the Tuamotu Islands.

#### Struck Island at Midnight.

The cyclone reached the velocity of 120 miles an hour. It struck the islands about midnight on Feb. 7, and continued until about 4 o'clock on the next afternoon. The island of Anaa, Tuamotu group, is telieved to have been the center of the storm.

At Papeete about 7 p.m. on Feb. 7 the sea began to break heavily over the reef the waves in the harbor washing over the quay. There was no perceptible wind. Toward 10 o'clock persons dwelling on the waterfront abandoned their homes, many saving a small portion of their belongings. The merchants and clerks went to the stores and warehousts only to discover that it was impossible to save goods on the lower floors. 


CHART SHOWING SOUTHERN PACIFIC ISLANDS, SWEPT BY DE-
