## TWO KILLED IN 250 MILE RACE AT INDIANAPOLIS MOTODROME

Third Dies From Injuries Received Wednesday—Wm. A. Bourque, Knox Driver, and Mechanician Receive Fatal Injuries When Car Hits Fence.

Indianapolis, Aug. 19.—Two lives were lost and two records broken during the inauguration of the Indianapolis motor speedway today.

William A. Bourque, driver of the Knox car in the 250-mile race, and Harry Holcomb, his mechanic, were killed in the frenzied carnival of speed. Another mechanic, Cliff Litterall, a Stoddard-Dayton employee, died today of injuries he received Wednesday when he was run over by a racing car.

**Barney Oldfield There.**  
Barney Oldfield, driving a high-powered Benz, covered a mile in 43.10, breaking De Palma's mark of 35, and Louis Chevrolet, in a Buick, negotiated ten miles in the marvellous time of 8:56 4-10, cutting Oldfield's time of 9:12. Both of these are new American track marks.

**Burman Won 25-Mile Race.**  
Robert Burman, in a Buick car, won the 250-mile race, the feature of the day, and the contest which cost Bourque and Holcomb their lives. The winner's time was 4:38 4-10—slow because of the many accidents that marred the race. The Stoddard-Dayton (Clements) was second in 4:46:01 8-10, and the National (Merz).

**Changes Ordered.**  
The death of the two men caused the American Automobile Association to issue an ultimatum to the owners of the big track that certain changes must be made by tomorrow or the sanction of the races will be withdrawn. The American Automobile Association demands that the track be freed from its many dangerous ruts, which are claimed to be unavoidable in a new track, and that every inch of it be thoroughly oiled and tarred.

**Must Be Oiled.**  
Today only a short portion of the grand stand was oiled and the dust on the other parts is blamed for the collapse of two drivers in the long race—Louis Chevrolet and Fred Mills—who were blinded by the dense white dust that covered the major portion of the track.

Two records had been broken and the first day of racing over the immense track had failed to be an unqualified success, when a pall was cast over the crowd of 12,000 excited spectators by the sudden death of Bourque and Holcomb.
