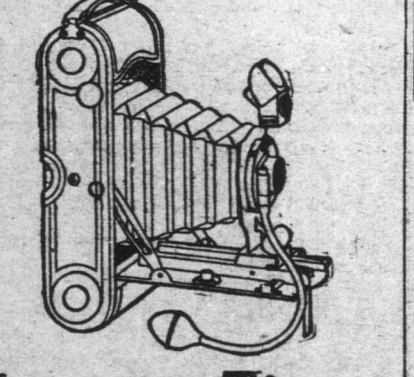

Col. J. W. Little, first vice-president, presided at the meeting in the absence of Mr. W. J. Reid, while others in attendance were: William McNeill, E. Douglas, J. H. Saunders, Dr. Routledge, James Murray, William Moore, R. A. Carrothers, William Spenser, Ald. Wm. Robinson, J. Hale, Ald. Johnson, and Secretary A. M. Hunt.
A committee composed of Dr. Routledge, Ald. Robinson, William Moore, and J. H. Saunders was named to attend the Toronto Exhibition on behalf of the Western, as it is expected that a large number of entries will be handed in by exhibitors at the Queen City show.

Sarnia, Aug. 29.—Slaty skies and a steady rain marked the opening day of the West Lambton County Fair here. Along about noon, however, the rainfall ceased, although the skies remained clouded. The fair officials were not discouraged, however, and everyone on the ground was busy preparing for the opening of the program in the afternoon.
The merchants' and manufacturers' exhibit will be one of the most attractive features of the big summer show. The progressive businessmen of the town have vied with each other in displaying their various wares, and the numerous booths containing the exhibits are delightfully decorated.
Entries Numerous.
The list of entries is surprisingly large and wagonload after wagonload is being received. It is estimated that the displays of fruit, vegetables, live stock and poultry will be the best ever seen here, and the building contains a fine display of Lambton's marvelous progress in this industry.
The farmers' races, motorcycle races and others arranged for the afternoon were cancelled because of the muddy condition of the track.
The other attractions for the entertainment of the public were not affected by the weather.
Today's fine weather is bringing out a large crowd.

Mayor Graham will be asked to issue a proclamation, calling upon the citizens of London and the businessmen to decorate and add to the attractions of the city during exhibition week.
The entries are now pouring in so rapidly that the staff of Secretary Hunt has been greatly increased, and night work has been commenced in an effort to keep up with the work. Arrangements have also been made to keep the offices open on Labor Day to handle any business coming in and to avoid an accumulation of entries.

Big Leamington Display.
Wednesday produced an exceptional rush in the registration of entries, one fruit man from the Leamington district making application for space for 100 varieties. Several others, nearly as large, have also been obtained.
The Agricultural Hall is also filling up, the roots and vegetables displays being exceptionally promising. Mr. John Sherman, of Tambling Corners, has arranged for something unique and of unusual excellence.
The London Branch of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association will also prepare an attractive exhibit, and at the conclusion of the fair, the entries will be donated to the different charitable institutions of the city.
The display of motor cars this year promises to rival if not exceed the Automobile show. Many companies have reserved space, completely filling the transportation building, and it is now necessary to allot space under canvas on the grounds.
The horse and stock entries are also filling up rapidly, and while these usually appear in a rush at the last moment, sufficient for a good-sized show have already been entered. The deputation to Toronto expects to double the number while at the National Exhibition.
