NEW YORK, August 4 .- The White Star liner Olympic hurried into port tonight with lights out and several hours in advance of her arriving time, because the British cruiser Essex warned her master by wireless "to look out for the enemy.'

Captain Herbert J. Haddock, of the Olympic, said he received a code communication from the Essex, and immediately ordered full speed ahead. On the last day's run the giant liner averaged 231/4 miles an hour, and Captain Haddock was emphatic in his praise of his engine room force.

Most of the passengers knew nothing of the latest developments in the European situation until yesterday, when Captain Haddock bulletined "war news," based on the very meagre wireless messages received by the Olympic. The passengers upon arriving at Quarentine offered a testimonial to the captain, praising his conduct throughout the voyage.
