# FORCE DISASTER

Pursuit Conducted on Broadest Scale Yet Known in War.

RUSHING THE ADVANTAGE

Might Attempt Another Stand Against His Pursuers.

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, Sept. 14.-10:10 p.m.-Except for the army which has been attacking Verdun, the German forces in France have fallen back all along the line, according to the French official report issued this afternoon. From Nancy to Vosges they have

withdrawn from French territory, while on the extreme right, General Von Kluck and General Von Buelow continue to retreat to the northeast before the French and British, even giving up their defensive position on the River Aisne, between Complegne and Soissons Further west, the German detachments that held Amiens have moved

northeastward to try to rejoin the German army of the right at St. Quentin. It is possible that all the Germans in Northwest France have done likewise otherwise they would be in danger of being cut off in the centre. 
