Adolescent children in London may attend school on Saturdays from now on, according to the Hon. Dr. Grant, minister of education, who, in an of communication Monday Senior School Inspector V. K. Greer, roves of the move.

Local school authorities are con fident that this innovation in procedure will reduce to an appreciable minimum all such difficulties as are now encountered in connection with the enforcement of the adolescent school attendance act.

The new scheme will become effective immediately, and the majority of the industrial concerns employing adolescent children have given as surance that they will co-operate in

Explaining that the Saturday proprosal has been copied from the De-troit system, Dr. Weir, public school ttendance officer, believes that thmajority of the students will now enabled to locate employment during the other days of the week that will allow them to attend the part-time classes eight hours on Saturday.
