

BITTERLY CONDEMNS ACTION OF M'MURRAY

Judge Monet Terms Act As
Blow To Administration
of Justice.

Montreal, April 16.—Caustic comment on the action of the Canadian solicitor-general, Hon. E. J. McMur-

ray, who amended a sentence of 25 years in jail and 25 lashes imposed on Raoul Beauchamp, convicted bank robber, by eliminating the lash, was indulged in tonight by Judge Amedee Monet. He characterized this mitigation as "an insult to the judge" who pronounced the sentence and a serious "blow to the good administration of justice." He said that with the growing frequency of holdups the penalty of the lash was not too severe a chastisement, and that "there will always remain for those bandits the privilege and the right of recourse to him who seems to wish to constitute himself their official protector—the solicitor-general, Hon. E. J. McMurray."

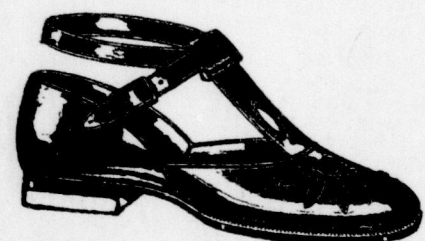

TRADES COUNCIL URGED TO ASSIST NEW LABOR PAPER

Educational Association Secret-
ary Stresses Need of Back-
ing Official Organ.

BARBERS COMPLAIN

"Unless you can support a Labor
paper you may as well close up the
trades and labor organizations in
Canada" was the startling statement
of Joseph T. Marks, secretary of the
Labor Educational Association be-
fore the London Trades and Labor
Council last night.

Mr. Marks, who came to London to
outline the efforts being made to
launch a provincial Labor paper, stat-
ed that organized Labor is slowly,
but surely being strangled to its
doom, simply because there is no
monthpiece by which it can speak for
itself. "You know as well as I do
that until organized Labor has a
paper of its own the organization will
never amount to a row of beans," he
said. "I have been connected with
Labor for something like 44 years,
and never before have I seen Labor
jeopardized as it is today, simply
through the lack of co-operation be-
tween all the unions."

Progress Made.
He referred to the great improve-
ment made in the Niagara Peninsula,
where, he said until a few months
ago, the Labor movement was stag-
nant. But now the members are com-
ing back, he declared, and hoped
that London would be well rep-
resented at the convention to be held
in St. Catharines on May 24.

Delegate Smith, representing the
union barbers, made things hum by
stating that if the union barbers of
this city depended on organized
Labor for business, there would be
about five of the 25 remain in busi-
ness. He said that London was the
hardest hit of any city in Canada in
regard to this existing situation.
Delegate Smith declared that this
was particularly true in the Hamil-
ton road district.

Secure Fair Grounds.
John Ashton, chairman of the Labor
Day committee, reported that they
had secured the fair grounds for this
day.

William Tite, chairman of the wel-
fare committee, reported that Mayor
Wenige held a meeting of all the
employers of the city asking them if
they could do anything to relieve un-
employment. However, all employ-
ers stated that they were employ-
ing as many men as possible, and
had little to offer in the way of sug-
gestions that might remedy the situa-
tion.

He read also a report of the pe-
tition forwarded to the government
against the proposed changes in the
compensation act. The petition had
been successful, he said, in protect-
ing the compensation act from be-
coming a political football.

WILL SEEK AGAIN USE OF ARMORIES FOR HOBBY FAIR

Military Training Season Pro-
hibits Use of Building For Ex-
hibition, Officials Say.

COMMITTEE NAMED

The Rotary Club Hobby Fair com-
mittee was told that the Boys' Hobby
Fair could be held at the armories
during the week of May 12, and now,
after a considerable sum of money
has been spent on advertising, the
military authorities inform the com-
mittee that the fair cannot be held
in the armories at that time because
it would interfere with the summer
recruiting campaign.

This was the opening statement
made by Roy Cunningham at the
meeting of the Rotary Club Hobby
Fair committee held in the rooms of
the Chamber of Commerce at the
Tecumseh House yesterday afternoon.

There followed a discussion as to
what should be done since more
than \$800 had been spent in ad-
vertising the fair.

The members felt that after such
an amount had been spent the mat-
ter should be treated with more con-
sideration by the authorities, and
took the view that the Hobby Fair
would in no way harm recruiting.

into the matter.
