SETTELL ACCUSES GABY OF PERJURY IN EVIDENCE

Former Secretary To Sir Adam Beck, Suddenly Changing His
Mind, Takes Stand at Hydro Probe and Levels Charges
Against Commission's Chief Engineer.

JUDGE OFFERS TO HAVE RECORDS PRODUCED

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Flatly accusing Chief Hydro Engineer F. A. Gaby of the Ontario hydro commission of deception and perjury in his evidence, Clarence Settell furnished an interesting con-
clusion today for the first session at the Parliament Buildings under Judge Snider, of the commission appointed to investigate the charges which Settell had levelled in a letter sent to Sir Adam Beck upon the occasion of the former's absconding with the proceeds of a \$29,000 hydro check. It was a climax which was all the more notable because unexpected, Settell having previously at a whole morning's sitting rigidly refused to testify at the probe which he had himself occasioned.

Involves Contracts.
The main charges centered largely about P. W. Sotthman, appointed chief engineer for the commission in 1906, and alleging that he had, while hydro engineer, taken the contract for the Robert Simpson Company's heating plant and also several Hamilton con-
tracts, executing them in the time of the commission, with the assistance of Mr. Gaby and with the knowledge of Sir Adam Beck. It was further alleged that Mr. Sotthman's recom-
mendation of acceptance of the F. H. McGuigan Company's tender for the construction of the Niagara Power Company transmission line had been forced by Sir Adam, the tender of the Murait Company having been lower but withdrawn one day before the contract was awarded. It was finally charged that Mr. Sotthman had padded his expense accounts, and that the expenses of "Machlett & Company," a firm in which he had been a principal, had been paid by the hydro with Mr. Gaby's knowledge.

These allegations were the only sections of the now celebrated Settell letter to Sir Adam Beck, which be-
came public at the probe today. The intention of the commissioner is to publish at one time only the charges relative to a single individual, and to have them closed before advancing further into the contents of the document. Today's matter, however, was left unclouded due to the fact that, after Mr. Gaby had made categorical denial of knowledge or participation in any irregularities, Settell challenged the truth of his evidence, and stated that if access were given him to hydro records he would produce vouchers which would substantiate his statements. Judge Snider and W. S. Brewster, K.C., commission counsel, promised that arrangements for such access would be made.

Modifies One Charge.
Only in one particular did Settell modify his charges. He had stated that in the case of Robert Simpson Company's heating plant, the hydro staff had been employed for, from one-half to two-thirds of its time. He withdrew this statement, saying: "I am not going to get any man in wrong." Such a course was consistent with his expressed refusal at the morning session to call any man employee to corroborate anything in his letter, because, "under the auto-
cratic rule of that man (Sir Adam Beck) any person coming here to corroborate anything in my letter would be a marked man from then on. He would be marked for dis-
missal or he would never get an increase as long as he lived."
It was only after hearing his charges denied absolutely by Mr. Gaby that Settell abandoned his ex-
pressed determination to give no relative to the letter which he had written. He had been in the room during the whole of the afternoon, however, attending to the evidence, and, after it was closed by W. G. Pierdon, hydro commission account-
ant, he was asked if he would recuse himself or if he would recuse to make any statement. He replied in the affirmative, stating that hearing the evidence had refreshed his mem-
ory and, accordingly, he would now, he trenchantly challenged the truth of Mr. Gaby's testimony.

Gaby's Statement.
In his statement to the commis-
sion, Mr. Gaby had denied absolutely the charges made by Settell. He was aware that Sotthman, then chief engineer of the commission, had super-
vised the work for the Robert Simp-
son Company, but he believed Sotth-
man had that privilege because of the small salary paid him by the hydro.
Mr. Gaby knew of no other outside work taken on by former Chief Engineer Sotthman, but said he had men calling at his office frequently and the inference was that there had been other work.

Concerning the McGuigan tender, which Settell charged had been forced, Mr. Gaby said that the tender of Murait & Company had been ir-
regular; it had been submitted for only a part and not all of the work; it had been on a unit basis—different than the McGuigan tender. In any event, had been withdrawn before tenders were let. "I have no knowledge," he said, "of the accept-
ance of the McGuigan tender (for the Niagara power lines) being forced."
—Did you, as stated by Settell, desire to have the fact that the tender was forced given publicity in the press?
—No. There is no truth in it.
Mr. Gaby said that the charge that all the expenses of the hydro com-
mission were paid by the hydro, was "not true. I believe Sotthman was interested in that company. The chief engineer of the hydro com-
missional life building. They handled X-ray equipment."

Q—Well, where does Settell get this?
A—I don't know how he gets it, except he knew Mr. Sotthman was acting in a financial way with Machlett & Co.

Q—Is all this the result of imagination, that this tender then had been forced?
A—It must be.
As regards the charge that Sotth-
man padded his expense accounts, Mr. Gaby said he had no knowledge of it, and he did not know how Settell was in a position to know it if he did.

HUNDREDS OF HAPPY PARENTS BEHOLD PAGEANT OF SEASONS

Over 300 Children Present
Play of Passing Months
in Ryerson School.

AUDITORIUM PACKED

If the architect of Ryerson school on the corner of Waterloo and Victoria streets intended the auditorium to be a community centre, the happy gathering place of two generations, then last night saw the consumma-
tion of his dreams.

For two hours, from 8 to 10, the school auditorium was filled with parents, just as many fathers as mothers, sitting and standing in the aisles, watching the more energetic and aspiring offspring, explaining the pageant of 1924 and the tale of the passing months.

More than three hundred children took part in this refreshingly bright little play, and were a credit to their instructors in their acting and dancing. In their really extra-
ordinarily clever clothes were to whoever made them.

The pageant was advertised very thoroughly to start at 8 o'clock, and 7:30, the staff began to turn people away from the doors, and kept at it until 8, and the show had started. As it was, every inch of standing room was filled up to the rafters, or resourceful persons finding chairs, which they used as improvised plat-
forms in the corners, which they used as seats.

The scene preceding this was a rose scene, in which Helen Prince, as Queen of the Roses, was given an opportunity to sing a song of a rose, which she did very effectively and nicely. In the chorus and in a state-
ly dance, such as one imagines a rose is entitled to, she was supported by a group of rose girls, whose dresses of rose shades won worthy applause.

London had its share of Irishmen at the founding of the city and has had its share ever since. After the bright moon, in which the valentines are sent and given and all true hearts beat a little faster, there appeared on the stage a half a dozen of the most Irish of Irishmen, in all the panoply of green with brogues on their feet, and the little bit of blackthorn in their hands. All that was Irish, or which thought it should be Irish, ac-
claimed them as the salt of the earth, and when the collectors in the dainties of aprons, all set with wif flowers and shamrocks, it was determined that most of the fathers and mothers in the room had a vote spot for the Emerald Isle.

Way down on the program, in the Indian summer weather, there came on a series of the most captivated, dresses which ever graced a school stage. All of those comfortable vegetables which are so good for the stomach, and which are so good for the pocket, were there. There were cabbages and potatoes and tomatoes and cauliflowers, and corn and oats and beans and peas and all the things that are grown in gardens to keep father busy in the summer and mother busy in the fall, when they have to be prepared for the oven and the saucepan.

These dresses were a revelation of the value of imagination in the costumes of the robes to a short, any kind, more especially of a pageant. They came at the end of the evening, when the grown-ups were tired, and the children of the younger children of bed. Never-
theless, everyone woke up to admire them and applaud, and the inventors were satisfied with their efforts.

NURSES TO ATTEND TECHNICAL SCHOOL

Advisory Committee Will Al-
low Victoria Hospital Nurses
To Use Equipment.

The advisory vocational committee of the board of education last night decided that the Victoria hospital technical high school for cooking classes, since proper accommodation is not to be had at the hospital itself.

The decision was arrived at after the committee had been waited upon by a deputation from the trust con-
sisting of Col. William Gartshore, Superintendent Dr. G. G. Clegg, Miss Grace Fairley, principal of the train-
ing school for nurses, and James Gray. The committee decided that the trust should be charged at the rate of \$24 per class in which any number up to 24 could be enrolled.

A. W. White, Harry Hayman and J. B. Walton were appointed a special committee to consider the purchase of equipment for the electrical depart-
ment and bring in a report.

The purchase was authorized of two fire extinguishers and three night watchman's clock stations for the new addition to be built.

Principal H. B. Beal reported that the coal supplied had tested 14,500 B.T.U., instead of 14,750 B.T.U., and that accordingly 1.65 per cent less value than the contract called for had been received. The committee decided to lay the matter over for the time being and take the same action in the matter as did the board of education regarding the shortage of B. T. U. in the coal purchased by it.

Other business transacted by the committee was merely of a routine character. Those present were Chairman A. N. Udy, Mrs. J. A. Rose, Harry Hayman, A. W. White, J. B. Walton and B. N. Campbell.

LEAVE TOMORROW TO BRING BARNED

Chief Welch of Niagara Falls
Will Go To New
Orleans.

ICEBOUND HARBORS HALT ARGENTINE WORLD FLIER

Tokio, Nov. 3.—Major Antonio Zanni's abandonment of his attempt to fly across the Pacific Ocean, announced yesterday, followed receipt of infor-
mation that the ports of Petropavlovsk and Paramushir are ice-bound, precluding the possibility of his securing a supply ship.

The Argentine flier has suggested to the committee in charge of his arrange-
ments that he either remain in Japan and continue his globe-girdling journey in the spring; proceed to Europe and thereafter fly the Atlantic, or fly to Buenos Aires via New York.

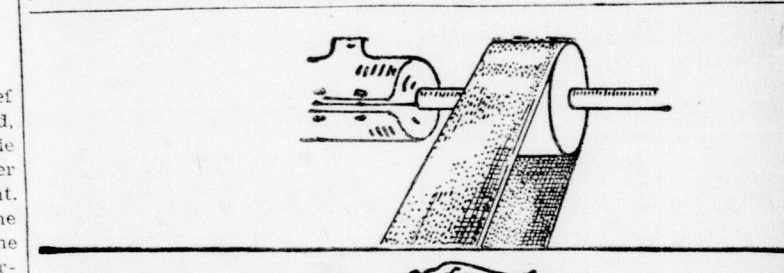

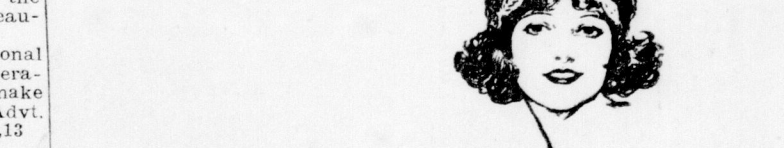
