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PRESENT MEMBERS ARE NOMINATED

D. A. Stewart and Henry Diette
Selected by Opposition
Party Here.

The friends of the opposition party met in convention Tuesday evening in the Imperial Theatre, here, to select the party's standard bearer for the coming election. The meeting was held in the theatre because of the large number of persons expected to attend the convention. Henry Diette, in the county was represented at the convention. The opposition party was particularly large, many of the friends of the party being unable to gain admission to the theatre.

Mr. J. A. Douglas of Campbellton was chosen Chairman of the meeting and Mr. J. A. Douglas of Campbellton was chosen Secretary. The Chairman in a few well chosen words both in English and French stated the object of the meeting and pointed out that only the delegates appointed at the various parish meetings would be permitted to vote when the selection of candidates was being made.

On motion of Mr. W. S. McGinnis the present representatives of the party, Messrs. D. A. Stewart and Henry Diette, were invited to take seats upon the platform, and were then called upon to address the meeting, which both gentlemen did.

At the conclusion of their remarks the convention proceeded with the work for which the meeting was called.

The first name placed in nomination was that of D. A. Stewart. This was followed by the name of Arthur R. Cullinan, who declined to have his name go before the convention, he stating it would be impossible for him to accept the nomination if it were tendered him. Henry Diette was then nominated, and on motion nominations were declared closed.

The standard bearer was then called upon to address the meeting and both made good speeches, first tendering their thanks for the honor bestowed upon them. Each pointed out the importance of organization, stating that considerable work along this line had already been accomplished but that there was much more yet to be done and asked all delegates upon returning home to obtain the work of organization and keep continually at it until polling day, and assured all that with their united support victory was sure to follow.

On motion a vote of thanks was tendered the Chairman and the meeting broke up with three roving cheers for the candidates.

LIQUOR SEIZED HERE EARLY YESTERDAY MORNING

Sub-Inspector P. S. Martin Captures Five Barrel
Consignment After Being on Job Only Two
Days—Local Vendor and Hotel Proprietor
Mentioned—Case Up Next Week.

After being in wait for more than twelve hours in a secluded corner of an up-town barn Sub-Inspector P. S. Martin's patient vigilance was rewarded early yesterday morning when he successfully captured a shipment of five barrels of beer and promptly lodged it in the police station here. It is alleged that the liquor was addressed to a local vendor but that it was being imported by the proprietor of a local hotel.

It appears that information to the effect that such a scheme was being practiced in Campbellton reached the ears of Inspector Martin a few days ago and he accordingly got busy. Having learned where the liquor was stored the inspector, accompanied by constable Ross, waited and watched throughout the night for the next morning on the part of its owners. Nothing happened until about five o'clock and then in the frosty stillness of early dawn a wagon drove up and the occupants began to load the beer. As they started away Martin boarded the vehicle unknown to its occupants and as they approached the police station he invited them in and requested them to leave their load in the custody of the authorities.

Papers are being served today and the case will come up for hearing early next week.

Inspector Martin was appointed by Chief Inspector J. B. Hawthorne only last week and has lost no time in making a showing.

FUNDS RAISED FOR JAPANESE RELIEF

Over \$300 Collected So Far—No
Report Yet From Ward
Three.

So far only two wards have been heard from in connection with the campaign for funds in aid of Japanese Relief and the total so far raised amounts to \$316.95. Of this amount \$207 was collected in Ward II, while the balance \$109.95 was contributed by the citizens of Ward I. In speaking to Dr. Pinault this afternoon he said that so far he had no report from Ward III, and was at a loss to know what was responsible for the delay. It is hoped however that the total returns will be handed in by the end of the week as it is the intention to forward the money in to St. John early next week.

It might be added that the great need of the stricken Japanese people was brought to the attention of townspeople by the local Red Cross Society which is now busied with many varied and worthy activities and is becoming a very active body and a power for good in the community.
