

## FINANCE AND TRADE.

A good deal of wheat has been taken lately by Ontario millers, but how they manage to make a profit at present prices of flour is a conundrum. It is estimated that there is not over a million bushels of Ontario wheat in the province.

"There is very little Ontario wheat being carried now by dealers," was the remark of one in the trade yesterday. "We never had so little at this season of the year," he said, "and do not owe the banks anything. The cheapest markets just now are those of Toledo and Detroit. In Ontario prices are 7c to 8c too high to do an export business."

"Raw sugars are lower at the present time than at any previous period in my memory," said a dealer yesterday. "The price in New York is 22c, and it is said that the manipulations of the Sugar Trust are responsible for this."

At the monthly meeting of coal agents at New York on Thursday no changes were made in prices. Production for May is placed at 2,800,000 tons, as against 3,700,000 tons in May of last year.

The last shipment of Valencia raisins to London, according to advices from Denia of April 4, was 4000 quintals, which cleared the market of stocks. The price of selected raisins has fluctuated during the season from 13s to 14s 11d, closing at the last price. The total shipments amounted to 40,070 quintals, or 178,936 quintals less than last year. The crop hereafter will not likely be as large as before, due to want of cultivation, and lower prices will induce growers to reduce the acreage.

Late hay advices from England are of a very discouraging character, cable advices reporting sales of Canadian hay on Friday last at 7s and on Saturday at 6s 7d. One report says: "From London to Gravesend, hay, hay is to be seen on both sides of the river and the market is completely glutted." Later advices, however, state that at the lower prices a considerable quantity has been sold, and it is hoped the market will soon regain its normal condition.
