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THE BIG CONFERENCE.

IMPORTANT QUESTIONS TO BE CONSIDERED AT OTTAWA.

Cable and Steamship—Delegates Will Also Talk About Inter-Colonial Trade Relations—The Representatives of the Various Colonies That Will Take Part in the Conference.

The selection of Ottawa as the meeting place for the Inter-Colonial Conference, to be opened at Ottawa, June 22, West Australia, New Zealand and the West Indies are practically the only self-governing portions of the empire that have not yet notified the Dominion Government that they will be represented.

It is no ordinary mission that brings the representatives to this meeting, so that a number of miles from their native haunts—from Australia, from South Africa, and from the heart of the Empire—will be present.

Questions fought with the deepest interest to the Empire in particular, and to the colonies, will be discussed and considered, the projects should be discussed and considered on Canadian soil.
