

BOLSHEVISM

Organization as Projected in Russia

Article No. 2 by R. M. King in the Church Chronicle

From the turmoil and confusion which followed the great Russian Revolution and the abdication of the ill fated Czar Nicholas two conspicuous figures, Messrs. Lenine and Trotzky emerged and proceeded to organize the new Bolsheviki Government. This comprised two Grand Departments or features of organization.

FIRST—The Grand Council of state which embraced the Cabinet Ministers and other heads or departments of National Importance. In this council Lenine is president, Trotzky Minister of war.

SECOND The "Soviet" a local committee of management for cities and towns as well as for rural communities. The members of these Departments were to be elected to office by a universal suffrage franchise of the people. But not much could be expected for some time at least from the franchise of a people who were almost wholly illiterate. Less than three per cent of the people of the Russian nation can read and write according to the last census taken. Up to this date no elections have been held. But in the meantime both the Grand Council and the Soviet have been temporarily filled from the hosts of exile both men and women as well as many returned emigrants from America chiefly Jews, who had learned while abroad the mysteries of the three R's and the rudiments of political organization. These all rushed to the help of the new administration. The following business card published by a "Red" leader is suggestive of the character for leadership of some, at least of these adventurers. "Billy Gordon, an American negro pugilist in 1917 was doorman at the American Embassy in Petrograd. He is now a leading member of that city's Soviet government."

What may perhaps be called a third department of this government has been established by the reorganization of the Russian Army for frontier protection as well as control of the restless people at home. The method of enlistment of this army which has now reached considerable proportions has been quite unique. The Government seized all the food supplies in the section where enlistment was in process and then forced the men to join up because otherwise they and all belonging to them would be exterminated by utter starvation. If an officer or soldier deserted, both he and his whole family were hanged up and shot.

The Relation of the Pastor to the Church

I ask therefore for what intent ye have sent for me Acts 10:29.

If the work of the pastorate is to be carried on successfully and harmoniously it must be based upon a complete understanding between the pastor and his flock.

The probabilities are that nine-tenths of all the trouble in the world today, national, social and religious is but the fruit of misunderstanding.

The difficulty seems to be in the failure to catch the other fellow's view point. If we could only get the other fellow's angle of vision how vastly different would be our conclusions.

The purpose of this sermon is to shed some light on the all important subject the relation of the pastor to the church.

The assumption is not that the church is ignorant with regard to this subject; but rather the church would welcome such information as the pastor way have to impart.

This is a transitory age. There is so much coming and going, so many people coming into the church and so many leaving for other parts of the world, that a little education along this line is an absolute essential.

What then is the relation of the pastor to his church?

FIRST: The pastor stands related to the church as the teacher to the taught.

The pastor is the religious instructor of the church. He is responsible for the quality and quantity of all instruction imparted from the pulpit, and in view of his position, determines largely the nature of teaching in every other department of the church.

In view of the effect of such instruction as he may have to impart or superintend, his is a position of tremendous responsibility. Destinies may be determined by the bent of his mind. The soul may climb upward, or gravitate downward, according as he interprets life's verities. The strength of the church spiritually, socially and financially, is the measure of the man behind the desk.

SECONDLY: The pastor stands related to the church as the shepherd

to the flock. The pastor is the shepherd.

The aches and pains, the joys and sorrows, prosperities and misfortunes of the flock must find an echo in the pastor's heart. He must in a very real sense enter into and sympathize with all the personal and vital relations of every member of his large flock.

Every scar and tear must leave its impress upon his soul if he is to be a true and good shepherd.

Some extent of the magnitude of his task may be gathered from the fact that the pastor of your church is responsible for the well being of between four and five hundred church members and an equally large number of adherents.

THIRDLY: The pastor stands related to the church as the manager to his business.
