OBITUARY

Deacon James Jackson
Death removed from our midst on Friday last. Deacon James Jackson, a highly respected and esteemed citizen, whose work and influence was always for good.

Deacon Jackson at the time of his death was 78 years of age, and a very active man for his years, and was enjoying good health up to a week previous to his disease, when he contracted chills and entered upon his last illness.

He leaves to mourn their loss, a wife, two sons, Iris and Ernest, of Halifax; four daughters, Mrs. L. G. Roch, Bridgetown; Mrs. Percy Banks, Bridgetown; Miss Ruth attending Normal School and Miss Mary at home. The Red Cross Society is in existence and a almost a effort worthy of a place by the side of our churches and schools.

—Surely pride of country, pride of race, should stimulate us to every effort to help the healthy people. Canada is leading the way—Nova Scotia has led Canada in at least one branch of health activity, and our natural pride dictates to us "On with this work."

The next speaker was Dr. M. E. Armstrong, County Health Officer, who discussed Public Health questions and traced the tremendous lowering of death rate due to the awakening of public vigilance and general interest being taken in health matters. This, as well illustrated by the case of New York city, where 50 years ago the general death rate was 30 per thousand. Now it has been brought down to 12 and the despite teeming population and many small districts. In Nova Scotia the rate is 14 per thousand, not so good as New York, but during the last ten or fifteen years there has been considerable improvement due to public health effort and measures we coming more general.

The infant mortality rate has not been so much improved as the general rate. In New York city it stands at 87 but in Nova Scotia 141. In Toronto, London and other large cities, the death rate was about the same as in New York.

New Zealand infantile death rate was but 50 per thousand. These facts go to show that health is purchasable.

He touched upon the activities of the public health department educational work for expectant mothers and suitable treatment for young infants. Work among children of pre school age and life extension work among adults. The value of pre school and in school work carried on by Public Health nurses was far beyond the experimental stage. It was recognized all over the world as a necessity.

Rural district work presents many problems which the city nurse does not have to contend with, but the difficulties are not insurmountable. Our Public Health nurse, Miss Chute, has done a splendid work and work of this nature so important to towns and municipalities should be continued.

The Red Cross Society paid the expenses of nurses for a year and ask the Council to continue the work.

Country Clinics in Dental work nose and throat troubles, Tuberculosis and special clinics were held in Bridgetown and other county centres free or charge to the necessitous. Public Health measures were strongly supported by the Women's Institute who took great interest and gave support to those on their merits.

Dr. A. G. Nicholls, of Halifax, spoke on Cancer Control and gave many interesting facts. More people over forty years of age die from Cancer than from Tuberculosis. One woman is eight and one man in fourteen, over forty dies of Cancer. Cancer on the outside of the body which can be seen
