LETTER OF HIS EXCELLENCY SIR CHARLES BAGOT, G. C. B., &c., GOVERNOR GENERAL OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA, TO MR. LA FONTAINE, M. P. P.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, Kingston, 13th September, 1842.

Sir, Having taken with my most earnest and anxious consideration the conversation which has passed between us, and my desire to unite the aid of an amicable co-operation with you to the Government of British North America in this Province, I have therefore not waited for the result of your deliberation, but on the contrary have been considering how far it might possibly be in the views of those who have the confidence of that part of the population, so as to meet their necessities to this Government satisfactory to themselves, and at the same time accompanied by that mutual confidence which can alone make it beneficial to the country.

I have accordingly come, not without difficulty, to the conclusion that for an object so important as the retirement of the Attorney General, Mr. Ogden, it would be necessary to have a provision made for his commensurate with his long and faithful services. His retirement I am prepared to offer you the situation of Attorney General for Lower Canada, with a seat in the Executive Council of the Province, and a salary in lieu of the office of Solicitor General, in Lower Canada, has long been the object which I have always had in view might have been assisted and I have therefore been glad to see your suggestion of the name of your Government in British North America, whose effect which he never could again.
