RIOTS AT ERIE. We venture to say that events more remarkable than the recent railway riots in Erie never took place in a civilized country. The lake shore railway which runs from Buffal westward, passes through the small corner of Pennsylvania which abuts upon the lake. The railway guage prescribed by statute in the Quaker state is the broad one, while the lake road, both in New York and Ohio has the same guage as the road—4 feet 6.At first, the company conformed to the statute and made their road through Pennsylvania of the wide guage, although they were compelled twice to trans passengers and freight, in consequence. But by the bye, they obtained leave from the state to make the Pennsylvania part of the line to accord with the rest and they proceeded to the necessary alterations. One would have thought that a change so necessary to the efficiency of from anybody who had a spark of intelligence within him. They drove the employers of the road from the works, tore up the rails, burned down the bridges, and if anything more had been necessary to stop the alteration, they undoubtedly would have done it. Those acts were not alone committed by the drivers and runners who had derived the most

benefit from the transhipment; these people took their part in them, no doubt, but the outrages were sanctioned by the leading men of the place, countenanced by the Mayor and Council, and approved of by the local journals. They were not done in darkness but in daylight, and the perpetrators plumed themselves on their straightforward, open brutality. The contractors' workmen desired, it appears, to defend the road they had made, but the employers were apprehensive of bloodshed and restrained them. The difficulty is, however, that the civil officers charged with the care of the public peace are all on the side of the rioters, and that the Governor of the State, whose interference was asked, is also inclined o support them. Under these circumstances, it was necessary to apply to the Courts, and accordingly we observed that an injunction has been served on the people of Erie, requiring them to forbear their action against the railway. It yet remains to be seen whether the decrees of the judges can be enforced against the refractory that a war between the Western Powers and Russia, confined in all probability to the Black

About the only inference to be drawn from the official statement of the Mayor of Erie, Pa., relative to the recent railroad difficulties at that place, is, that the rioters were incited to acts of outrage mainly through fear of being deprived of the petty trade in the cake, pie, apple, and small beer line which a portion of them had hitherto enjoyed. An injunction has been granted by the United Statea Circuit Court against the city of Erie, and the inhabitants have been ordered to refrain from hereafter injuring the railroad track or bridges, or interfering to event the restoration of those portions of the road that have been destroyed. We shall now see what attention these lawless people shall pay to the decrees of the national court.
