## Business of the House BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Mr. Pickersgill: I wonder if the house leader would tell us what the business will be for the rest of the week?

Mr. Green: Mr. Speaker, tomorrow we shall commence with item No. 8 on today's order paper, which is second reading of a bill to amend the Yukon Act; then item No. 9, second reading of a bill to amend the National Parks Act; then item No. 3, a resolution to introduce a measure to amend the Canadian Farm Loan Act.

Mr. Pickersgill: That is No. 3?

Mr. Green: It is the third on the list. We hope to send this bill to the agriculture committee; then item 10 on the day's order paper, second reading of the Taxation of Estates Act, which is to go to the banking and commerce committee; items 4 and 5 dealing with income tax conventions—

Mr. Benidickson: I do not think the bill is available yet; No. 4 is not available yet.

Mr. Green: Item 6 on the day's order paper, second reading of the act to amend the Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act; then item 13, the resolution preceding a measure to establish a national parole board. Then, if these should go through, we will take the estimates of the Department of Trade and Commerce. I am not sure about Thursday, but we may take any of those measures or the estimates of the Department of Trade and Commerce.

Mr. Pickersgill: It is not proposed to go on with budget resolutions either tomorrow or Thursday?

Mr. Green: It is possible that we may take budget resolutions on Thursday.

Mr. Pickersgill: Would the leader of the house try to get the government to make up its mind as early as possible so that we may have a little advance information?

Mr. Green: Unfortunately it is not my mind that has to be made up.
