Mr. Speaker, naturally we hear arguments that it is not worse than hunting and wounding other animals which cover many miles in a sad condition before dying.

Many such examples could be given. But a distinction must be made clearly and definitely, and that is the excuses or the methods, in short, the inhuman practices used in some areas.

Very often, when hunting, for instance, certain methods are used involuntarily, but this is no excuse for resorting to a practice or another method in some other field, like during this season when the skins of baby seals are mostly obtained. In addition, it is a hunt organized on the spot. Therefore, the practices used at present should not be tolerated.

I am sure the minister intends to introduce legislation to amend sealing regulations and, for our part, we can assure the minister of our full co-operation with a view to using efficient sealing practices in the general interest.

What methods does the minister intend to suggest? What legislation does he intend to introduce in order to indicate the methods to be used? It is up to him, but in any case, before deciding on a method care must be taken to choose the surest, the most efficient, the most humane one, so that present practices will no longer be tolerated.

We are anxiously awaiting the measures that the government intends to take and I hope it will be to the satisfaction of all, in order to put an end to this inhuman situation which occurs every year at this time during the seal hunt.
