man, woman, and child some \$500, and its detailed accounting of predatory and monopolistic business and trade practices, thus requiring the Government of Canada to take urgent and immediate action to put a stop to the biggest consumer rip-off in Canadian history.

**Madam Speaker:** The hon. member for Oshawa (Mr. Broadbent) has given me notice under the terms of Standing Order 26 within the time prescribed. The hon. member seeks to move the adjournment of the House to discuss the matter of price gouging by the petroleum industry as indicated by the release of a report yesterday.

I might mention at the outset that during yesterday's question period a substantial number of questions were posed to the government on this very subject, and today the hon. Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs (Mr. Ouellet) did indicate in his answers that the matter had been referred to the Restrictive Trade Practices Commission.

It has been ruled by my predecessors on several occasions that matters of this nature, having been referred either to the courts or an administrative body, are not proper subjects for debate in this House under the terms of Standing Order 26. Furthermore, the provisions of Section 5 of this Standing Order are very clear, in that the Chair "shall have regard to the probability of the matter being brought before the House within reasonable time by other means." I have not been convinced that the publication of a report, even on a very important subject, constitutes an emergency contemplated by this Standing Order.

The House is well aware that the main estimates and supplementary estimates, tabled recently, are now before the various committees of the House. Also, we are presently in a supply period which provides an opportunity for members to discuss a subject matter of their choice.

Therefore, for these reasons, I regret that I cannot accept the hon. member's application for a debate under Standing Order 26.

2. Are volumes I and II of the study available to the public free of charge and, if not, what is the cost and where can copies be obtained?

Hon. Paul J. Cosgrove (Minister of Public Works): I am advised by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation as follows: 1. The total cost of the study was \$529,789. CMHC's share of the cost was \$366,300 and the balance was provided through provincial contributions.
