"The Germans were violating a fundamental law of tactics; trying to fight more than one battle at a time. They were about fifteen miles from Paris. They had failed to remove the civilians in invaded territory and the army was being depleted to guard lines of supply and send men to the Russian front. If the enemy appeared in force, their lines of communication would probably break down. It was neces-sary to pull back and stabilize on a front they could hold.
