THE CONJUNCTION.

§79. A Conjunction is a word used merely to connect the parts of a sentence.

Conjunctions are also Simple (as, cho, as, so; gu, gur, that;) and Compound (as air an abhar sin, therefore; ach coma co dhiù, nevertheless, notwithstanding.)

Some Conjunctions are used in pairs and are said to be co-relative; as cho.....ri, so.....as; an.....neo, whether.....or; araon.....agus, both.....and.

THE INTERJECTION.

§80. An Interjection is a word or phrase of exclamation denoting some strong emotion, but not entering into the grammatical construction of the sentence; as, hacidh! hallo! seall! faic! feuch! behold! lo! thugad! hook it! ho ró! huzza!
