FAMOUS SPEAKERS
WILL MAKE ORATIONS

And Commemorate the Creating of Peace at the Hog Island Celebration.

SARNIA, Aug. 19.—(Special).—The international peace assembly to be held at St. Ignace during the week is creating unusual comment through the country. Letters and phone messages from far and near are being received by the management as to what it is and what its importance. The American Peace and Arbitration League, of which Theodore Roosevelt is honorary chairman, has offered to send Louis Lochner to speak on international peace. Prof. Hornor of Victoria College, Toronto, and B. N. Langdon, D.D., of London, Eng., one of the ablest speakers in the cause of international peace, who is now in the city, are expected to attend. The object of the international peace assembly is to dedicate St. Ignace to the cause of perpetual peace to build on the island a big auditorium, seating thousands of persons, and have an annual international assembly lasting for two months. It is a sort of jubilee commemorating the victory of peace between the United States and Canada for one hundred years and to create sentiment in favor of its everlasting perpetuity. The assembly is to be held from Aug. 24 to 31.

JONES WILL FACE
CHARGE OF FORGERY

Police Think That He is a Young Man With a Long Undesirable Record.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Aug. 19.—(Special).—Information was received by the local police this afternoon from the criminal records department at Ottawa stating that the finger prints forwarded from here on Friday of a young man giving his name as Charles Jones and who was arrested while endeavoring to sell certificates for 1200 shares in the Ontario Mining Company in the office of O'Connor & Sheridan, local stock brokers, resembled those of a man named Anthony Bell, who was sentenced on Oct. 19, 1907, to serve three years in Kingston Penitentiary for burglary and theft in Toronto. Bell was paroled with eleven months and nine days to serve. Jones will be charged here with forging the name of Charles Jones to the stock certificates. The owner of the shares is supposed to reside in Sudbury.

INJURED MAN HAD TO
FLAG TRAIN FOR HELP

Struck by an Express, James Young Received Injuries That May Be Fatal.

CHATHAM, Aug. 19.—(Special).—James Young, an American, aged 27 years, had a painful experience last night as a result of which he may lose his life. Young was walking the G.T.R. tracks to Ringfield, where he had secured a position, when he was struck by an express train. He received a broken leg, a fractured arm, and his head and shoulders were badly injured. The engineer of the passenger train evidently did not know that he had struck him, for the train did not stop. Young lay on the roadbed for over an hour, unable to move anything but his left arm, and with no one to give him assistance. Seeing a freight train approaching, he lit a number of matches and flagged the train. The crew of the freight train, after learning his condition, brought him into Chatham where his injuries were attended to. He is now in the hospital in a very precarious condition.

THREATEN DOCTORS
WITH PROSECUTION

SARNIA, Aug. 19.—(Special).—The district medical health officer has reported to the police here that some of the local doctors are threatening prosecution of a serious nature to the proper authorities, as required by law. The cases in question are mostly typhoid fever, and the doctor threatens that prosecution will follow if the cases are not reported when discovered.

PULMOTOR WOULD
HAVE SAVED MAN

Coroner Vardon Urges Necessity of Galt Purchasing a Machine.

GALT, Aug. 19.—(Special).—Percy Olds, of Simcoe, aged 28, one of the employees of the Galt, Shapley & Muir of Brantford, engaged on a Galt contract, was drowned in the Grand River while bathing with two fellow workmen. He was wading across and slipped into a deep hole. The body was recovered from the river and was conveyed this evening to Simcoe. Dr. Vardon, the coroner, says that if the town was provided with a pulmotor the drowned man might have been resuscitated.

After Taking Poison, Mrs. Redden Wanted Her Husband to Be Told.

KINGSTON, Aug. 19.—(Special).—After drinking a dose of carbolic acid in the waiting room for the C.P.R. station this morning Mrs. Redden, aged 39, wife of Frank Redden, a cab driver, went up to the E. F. Flett, and asked him to telephone to a cab stand and tell her husband that she had taken poison. She also wrote a card informing her husband that she had taken carbolic acid, and there it was stated that she had a good chance of recovery. Mrs. Redden was married two years ago, and she said that trouble with her relatives led her to take poison. Her home is in Olden, Ont.
