or the goodness of their hearts; that they have now a fingle enemy in America. They have lost the confidence of the people, by having plunged them into all the horrors of a civil war; a war, which, if we may judge of the future by the past, can never be fuccessful, notwithstanding the affected contempt of the strength of the Americans. Another set of men, he says, want to yield up all that is worth contending for. This is a most unwarrantable affertion with regard to the very respectable Minority in both Houses of Parliament. I believe I shall not be disavowed when I maintain. that there is not a man of them who is difposed to give up any territory of which we are in possession. With regard to the continent of America, it is a joke to talk about yielding it up; we might as well talk of vielding up Spain, because we are in postession of Gibraltar; or surrendering France. because we have a garrison at Jersey and Guernsey. Every body knows, that beyond the range of our cannon, we do not possess a foot of ground from Nova Scotia to Florida. Let us fee then what we actually possels.
