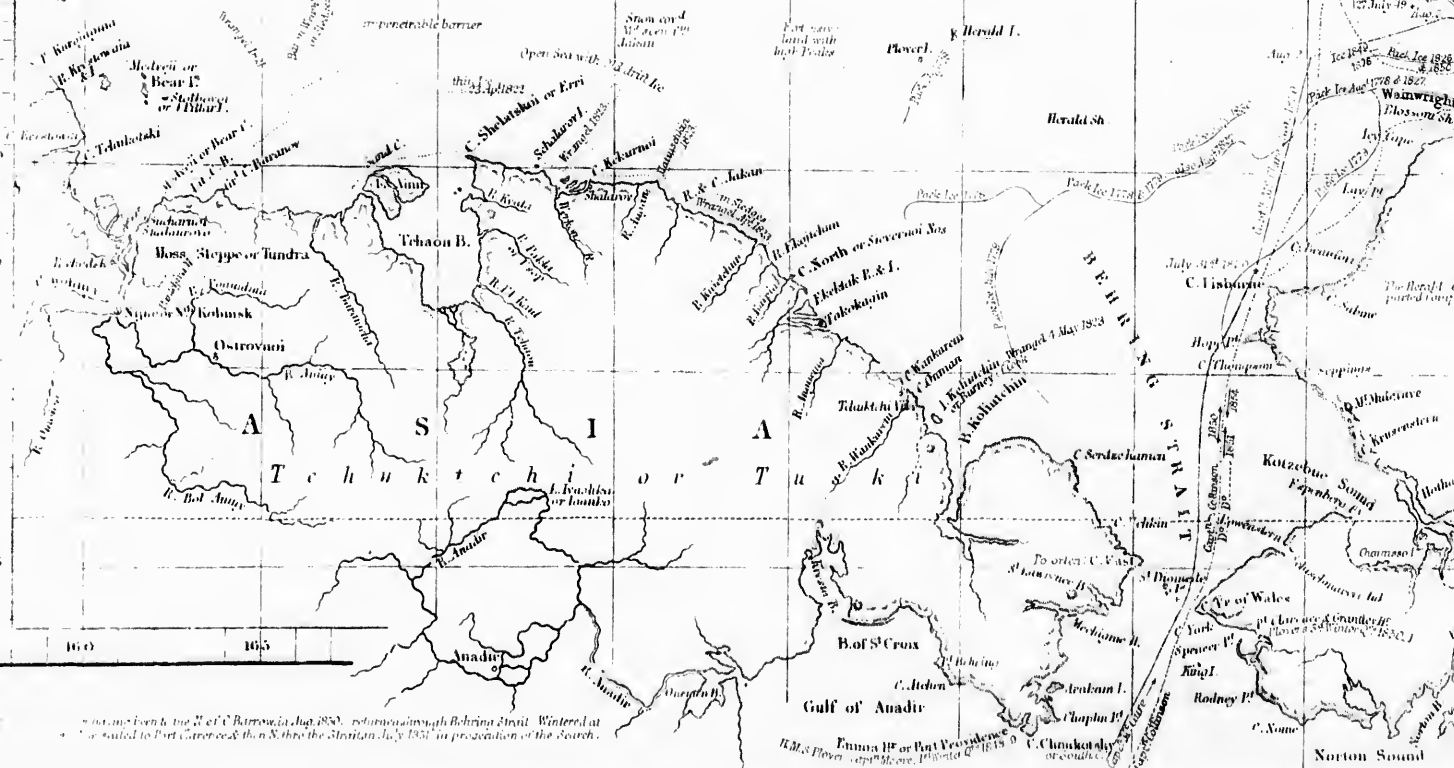

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Capt^m M^cClure, in H.M.S. *Investigator*, sailed Eastward from Behring Strait, examined the coast of Wales Str., finding its N.E. entrance closed by ice, 15 Aug 1850. Capt^m Maguire, in H.M.S. *Flover*, wintered 1852, 3 in Elson Bay, East of Plover Sledges & Dogs, over ice he examined the coast Eastward 170° to Sir John Franklin's natives told Capt^m Maguire, they had been on board Capt^m Collinson's Ship, in 1850.

Capt^m Collinson, of H.M.S. *Enterprise*, in the Summer of 1850, sailed thro Behring Strait to the N.E. of Plover, he returned & wintered 1850. He sailed thro Behring Strait & navigated along the N. shore of America, passing C. Bathurst (26th Augst). Early in 1852 he surveyed Minto Inlet & Peabody St., he then passed S. & E. of Dease Str., & wintered 1852, 3 in Cambridge Bay, Victoria Land, in April & May Sledge journey, E. & N.E. to Gateshead, I. near Plover, Plover's furthest E. in 1851 (which he had navigated 9° of Long to the E. of Capt^m M^cClure's furthest E. in 1850) E. of Mercy Bay where Capt^m M^cClure left the *Investigator*, he then repassed Dease & C. Bathurst (where he doubled 1st Sept^r 53), & anchored in Camden Bay, 11th Sept^r, leaving this Bay 20th July 1854, he passed Plover & Behring Str. in Augst & returned to the Strait.

M^cClure when in Pr. Wales Str. & also in Mercy Bay was 73rd Parry's furthest, & Col^l of Pr. Wales Str. was 63rd Parry's furthest.
