The principal remaining PUBLIC BUILDINGS, which are, however, unworthy of notice, and will probably soon be replaced by others, are:

The old Government House, Notre Dame street.

The old Court House, Notre Dame street.

The old Jail, (present Court House,) Notre Dame street.

The Barracks, Water street.
