Water in St. Lawrence Abnormally Low at Cornwall.

CORNWALL, Aug. 30.—The water in the St. Lawrence River is so low that in order to keep the water in the canal up to the required level for navigation, it was necessary to close off the water from all the local factories at noon today.

The steamer Riverside, which went ashore above the St. Lawrence Power Co.'s power house a week ago to-night, is still stuck fast, although the water was raised to the limit and several tugs tried to pull her off.
