

There is the genuine touch of sympathetic life about every incident in the entire action.

And while the lines of the play are opening out, the music goes on in a most appealing way. Puccini painted the less of these truly human young people in a way that faithfully and significantly tells their story in music. The singing of the various parts merits the warmest praise. Mme. Ferrabint, in the role of Mimi captured the hearts of her bearers with her fervor and fineness of voice. Her histrionic ability was strikingly shown in the particular death scene.
