HYDRO-ELECTRIC EXTENSIONS ASKED FOR

Government Commission Will Take Care of Territory Adjacent to Toronto, According to a Letter Read at York Township Council Meeting.

Reeve Watson presided over a full attendance at the fortnightly meeting of the York Township Council yesterday afternoon, in the council chamber.

The following letter from W. J. Sweeney, acting general manager of the Toronto Hydro-Electric System, was read:

"With regard to the Toronto Hydro-Electric System furnishing electrical energy for the district in the district in your township lying between Woodbine-avenue and Dawes-road, I am pleased to inform you that the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario has advised us that they will be pleased to handle the matter direct, and I believe that the Hon. Adam Beck has taken kindly to the situation with your solicitor, Mr. J. L. Starr, if not, intends doing so. This places us in a position that whatever services we supply it will be under the order of the provincial commission. Trusting that you will arrive at a speedy and satisfactory arrangement with them."

S. W. Norman, lower clerk of North Toronto, forwarded the following letter: "Certain residents on Victoria-avenue, in the Township of York, are desirous of having us supply them with electric current for lighting purposes. These parties are in a peculiarly situated, and unable to obtain electricity from any other source. We would, therefore, request permission to erect poles and string wires along Victoria-avenue to supply their needs in this respect."

Postal Delivery. The following letter, received in a covering letter from F. Maclean, M.P., was read from the deputy postmaster-general, R. M. Coulter: "With reference to your letter of recent date, with regard to covering the Township of York by letter-carrier delivery, and the remainder by rural mail delivery, I beg to say that on making a study of the map of the Township of York, I find that a section bounded on the south by Annet-street, on the east by Bunymede-road, on the north by Dundas-street, and on the west by Langmuir-avenue, it is found that the names of the following streets will have to be changed before letter-carrier delivery can be made, namely: Victoria-avenue, Howland-avenue, Maple-avenue, Alexandra-avenue, Rose-avenue and Herbert-avenue, as there are now streets within the city limits bearing these names. If this difficulty is overcome, the houses properly numbered and streets labeled, interesting points, letter-carrier delivery can be given to the district mentioned."

It was pointed out in the discussion that, followed that the council had no power to alter the names of the streets, nor to incur expense in numbering the houses, and it would rest with the residents of the district to adopt measures in compliance with the postmaster-general's request.

Annexation Again. Mr. Dixon of 1034 Sinclair-avenue appealed to the council for their assistance in obtaining a better water supply for the district lying between Dufferin-street and Upper Canada College. He proposed on account of the inability of the people to pay their water rent, but they required security for the capital cost from some responsible body. He further pointed out that the city would be compelled to take in part of the district in connection with the sewerage scheme, and contended that with the council's assistance the annexation of the whole district comprising about 640 acres with a population of 1700 might be accomplished.

Solicitor J. R. L. Starr said: "While the council sympathizes with you in your efforts to secure an efficient water supply, they have no power to guarantee the capital cost, neither have they the authority to collect water rents. If you succeed in uniting with the city, my advice is that you should get a petition signed by the majority of the ratepayers of the village, and present it to the board of control."

Councillor Syme pointed out that if the ratepayers of the village consented to the annexation, the council would support the claim by showing the desirability of annexing the whole district, seeing that part of it is now required to complete the sewerage scheme.
