Prior to that he was a writer on Sporting Life and The Washington Star, and subsequently he was sporting editor of The Washington Post. In 1902 at the request of President Pulliam Mr. Heydler compiled the National League averages for that season, and he became the president's private secretary in 1908. In 1907, when the office of president-secretary, a position he has filled very efficiently ever since.

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
