### CAPT. TOM WALLACE GETS THE NOMINATION

Junction Orangemen Hold Fine Church Service—News Notes From York County.

In Capt. "Tom" Wallace of Woodbridge rest Conservative hopes of re-deeming Centre York, the largely attended and representative convention held in the Labor Temple Saturday afternoon placing him in unanimous nomination, after he, by a slim majority of three, been returned the winner over A. W. Milne of Markham Village.

The vote was 63 to 60, and almost simultaneously with the announcement of the result, Mr. Milne rose to his feet to move that the nomination be made unanimous. His nominator, Col. Selby, of Monrovia, promptly seconded, and the resolution carried with whole-hearted enthusiasm.

While Mr. Milne's supporters were naturally somewhat disappointed they joined heartily in the thunders of applause which greeted Capt. Wallace as he mounted the platform to express in a few words his appreciation of the honor conferred upon him, to promise a candid, vigorous fight and to declare his confidence that with the strong and individual support that was shown, he could carry the riding.

The convention, which was the largest and most enthusiastic that the riding has yet known, was evidently inspired by the same belief and confidence was free expressed that the Conservative majority would be at least 400.

When the meeting opened shortly after 1 p.m. it was with Dr. Godfrey, M. L. A., as chairman. The election of officers for the association resulted in the following being elected, all by acclamation:

President, Alfred Mason (L'Amoreaux); Vice-president, Dr. Robertson (Kleinberg); Secretary, J. Koeller (Weston).

President Mason then took the chair, and the meeting being declared open for the nomination of a candidate, the following were in the field:

Capt. T. G. Wallace, Woodbridge, by James Boyd, Cedar Grove, and Sam McChur, Elmdale; W. H. Pugsley, Richmond Hill, by Alexander Pingle, Unionville, and Alexander Baird, Scarborough.

A. W. Milne, Markham, by Col. Selby, Monrovia, and Geo. Bowers, Monrovia; Dr. Bull, Lambton Mills, by Arthur Clayton, Lambton Mills, and George W. Holdenby, Mimico.

Dr. Standish, Thelthetown, by Dr. Bull, Lambton Mills, and A. J. Miharg, Thelthetown; R. J. Bull, Weston, by W. Webster, Weston, and J. Taylor, Weston.

All retired with the exception of Capt. Wallace and Mr. Milne. Mr. Pugsley, in declining nomination, said he was in favor of a candidate in the field, and suggested that the riding would be an excellent opportunity for the candidature of W. F. Maclean, M.P.

Dr. Bull, who likewise would have preferred to delay choosing a candidate, said he was quite willing to fall in with the general wishes.

Mr. Milne said he would allow his name to go before the convention, not with any intention of creating opposition, but in order to allow more material from which a choice might be made.

terian Church. After forming up at the lodge room on Dundas-street the members, numbering about 150, marched to the church to members abreast, preceded by the King Edward Pipe and Trumpet Band of Toronto, and the Junction Band, playing patriotic airs. The service was opened by Rev. Dr. Hazelwood, and the address was given by Rev. Dr. Pidgeon. The offertory was on behalf of the Protestant Orphan's Home.

Dr. Pidgeon made a stirring appeal for a more aggressive Protestantism, especially in Quebec and the Eastern Provinces, and spoke from the standpoint of a native of the Province of Quebec. He spoke of the attacks made from time to time, to weaken the Protestant faith, as the Jesuits' estate bill and the Manitoba school question, which attacks, he declared, have been in evidence ever since confederation. He stated that the French Catholics were gaining control everywhere in Quebec, and in many districts in eastern Ontario, while in Glenora they were boasting of shortly erecting a cathedral in that vicinity. In districts where Roman Catholics were not powerful, the people were drifting into unbelief, a condition of affairs similar to that which now exists in France, and yet in these districts no Protestant church or mission is to be seen. In the vicinity of the City of Quebec, there are at the present time 150 Protestant children attending Roman Catholic schools, because there are no Protestant schools in the neighborhood.

Rev. Dr. Hazelwood preached a Protestantism, and Rev. Dr. Pidgeon occupied the pulpit at the Annette-street Methodist Church.

The Independent Order of Foresters will hold a rally in St. James' Hall on Tuesday evening. Bro. Nimmo, J. F., has succeeded in getting over 200 new members, while Mrs. Campbell, the D. S. C. R., has secured 100 lady members. This large accession will be celebrated on Tuesday evening by a concert and luncheon. Among the speakers will be Bro. Lawless, assistant supreme chief ranger; Bro.
