Discourse Upon by Lord Rosebery at Manchester.

ADVANTAGES TO ENGLAND EULOGIZED.

Condition of Agriculture Abroad is Worse Than at Home, He Said.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Quoted as "A Most Illustrious Authority, Sustaining the View That it is Free Trade Which has Preserved and Consolidated the British Empire..."

Manchester, Eng., Nov. 1.—Lord Rosebery addressed a large meeting here this evening in connection with the centenary celebration of the Chamber of Commerce.

Lord Rosebery contended that the condition of agriculture abroad, despite bonuses and protection, was little better, in some cases worse, than in England.

He fully agreed with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, declaring that any deviation from absolute political and commercial freedom would weaken the bonds holding the Empire together.
