FOUR VESSELS MEET WITH ACCIDENTS IN THE ST. LAWRENCE CONSIDER PACT

Navigation Mishaps Have Been Frequent in Last Three Days.

Quebec, Aug. 25.-The Lower St.

The steam barge Captain Dan, E. Gamache, master, struck a wharf while entering Quebec harbor early Friday morning and sank before she could be beached. Mrs. Annie Taylor, a widow, of Montreal, who was the vessel's cook, was drowned, but the rest of the crew were rescued from a capsized rowboat.
