READY FOR A CHANGE**

Statement is Made to Presbyterian Assembly—Appointment of Professor Causes a Flare Up.

HALIFAX, N.S., June 3.—(Special.)—At this afternoon's session of the Presbyterian Assembly, Dr. John McMillan of Halifax introduced the report of Pine Hill College, Halifax.

"She is ninety years old, yet in no sense dying or decrepit. She is stronger than ever. During her history fifteen professors have served her. Eight are gone, seven still are with the institution. We have given away Principal Gaudier, and to Toronto University a president. We have 432 graduates, 200 now on the roll of our school, with eighteen in the foreign field. We have called back a new principal, Rev. Clarence McKinnin. We are now recommending the appointment of a new professor—Rev. H. A. Kent M.A." It was sat \$2000 a year and free house. The report was ready to be adopted, when Dr. Sedgwick said the nomination was not unanimous. No interest would suffer if the appointment was delayed.

Simultaneous appeals to the people were made to-day by the western railroads and by the Illinois Manufacturers' Association. The railroads submit their brief to "the man in the street and the farmer," hinting hard times if the railroads are not permitted to increase their freight rates.

The manufacturers tell the people not to be deceived, as there is no danger of panic, and land President Taft for his action in halting the proposed increase in rates.

On behalf of the railroads, Sleson Thompson, head of the railway publicity bureau, put forward "four reasons why railroad rates must be raised." According to Mr. Thompson, the railroads in the last two years are \$220,000,000 behind on maintenance; they paid \$100,000,000 more annually for labor; they paid \$100,000,000 more annually for interest; they lost \$25,000,000 annually on passenger traffic; the total result that they are \$750,000,000 to the bad in two years.

At least \$200,000,000 which the railroads had tentatively arranged to spend in replacements, must now be used to stave off ruin, according to Mr. Thompson.

"Railway rates must be advanced because many companies otherwise would face bankruptcy," said Mr. Thompson. "This is a result which the injunction granted at Hannibal on ex-parte representation, without notice and without proper weighing of the consequences, may expedite but is powerless to undo."

Mr. Thompson declares that the shippers have been grossly deceived. He has charged the Associated Shippers' Bureau of Cincinnati with practicing the deception.

Foreign Missions.

Dr. McCurdy then presented the report of the foreign mission committee (eastern section). The fields under the jurisdiction, said he, were not many, nor large, but wide scattered. The expenditure of the year was a little over \$20,000, not quite met by receipts, the amount of the debt being about \$11,000, so that the committee had to pass all the estimates received from the various mission centres.

But the outlook was not discouraging. The debt of \$10,000 with which the preceding year closed, having been wiped out with the exception of \$500. The receipts from congregations show a large increase, \$38,420, as against \$21,275.

The statistical tables and reports abound in evidence of the divine favor, speaking of the faithful labor rewarded with bountiful harvests; but not less clearly do they speak of the loss of the harvesters, and the need of more workers.

The question of transmitting control of the new Hebrides mission to the Australian Church is before the assembly, with request that the synod be empowered to deal with it.

Aiding Home Missions.Dr. McKay, speaking from the pulpit, presented the report of the committee, western section.
An interesting fact brought out was that the committee, although known as the foreign mission committee, is contributing large amounts to home mission work. Last year, \$37,000 was thus expended. The doctor made an earnest plea for interest in the Chinese, as work which is worth while. The report notes a request from the North Formosa mission council for a new theological council at Taipei.

Dr. Buchanan of the mission field in India, is delegated by the fifth general assembly of the Church in India, and gave accounts of what is being accomplished there.

Mr. Gilbert of the Mission to the Indians, the next speaker, describing what is being accomplished by the mission, especially thru its schools.

Had Policemen Give Him Reports on Prominent Persons.

CLEVELAND, O., June 3.—City detectives may be properly employed to watch and report to their chief all public officials and prominent men who enter saloons, cafes or disorderly houses. This ruling was made to-day by the chairman of the civil service commission in the course of the trial of Chief of Police Kohler, accused of immorality, intoxication and malfeasance in office.

The ruling was made in connection with a charge that Chief Kohler had instructed his detectives to make private reports to him of any "officials, prominent business men or anyone connected with the city, visiting disorderly houses, grill rooms, cafes or saloons."

These reports, it was alleged, were entered by the chief for improper use. Counsel for the defence objected to the testimony on the grounds that the collection of the reports was not an offence and that no improper use had been shown. This objection was sustained by the court, which ruled that the chief had acted in accordance with correct police usage.

Other testimony introduced was to the effect that Chief Kohler had visited a disorderly house and acted familiarly with the inmates. The witnesses were women of the red light district and they testified that they had been abused and insulted by the chief's language. The hearing will be resumed Monday afternoon.

Two Bylaws to Be Submitted—An Accident to Railwayman.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 3.—(Special.)—Council will submit to the ratepayers a bylaw to raise \$2500 to erect a new fire hall in the south end of the city. The Collegiate Institute Alumni Association to-night decided to have members canvass votes for a bylaw to raise \$15,000 for a gymnasium and assembly hall. The majority of the council oppose the bylaw, deciding to submit it only after the collegiate board demanded such action.

Michael Murphy, a bridge-walker, narrowly escaped being killed by a train and having his body hurled hundreds of feet into the rushing river.
