

LONE SUBMARINE DID ALL DAMAGE

Admiral Cleaves Disbelieves Report That Flotilla Was Operating.

NO FURTHER ATTACKS

But Shipping Interests Fear Resumption of Warfare Off Coast.

Newport, R. I., Oct. 9.—The wholesale raid on the shipping south of Nantucket lightship Sunday was by one of our submarines, according to reports of American naval officers.

WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

IMPORTANT developments are reported in the despatches from the front north of Saloniki, recording allied advances at several points.

Not less remarkable are the successes of the Serbians in the course of their victorious advance. On the sector between the Vardar and the took 100 prisoners.

In the Dobruja the situation remains obscure. The Russians announce that their troops have fortified themselves on their newly acquired positions.

Viewed as a whole, the situation in the Balkans is satisfactory from the standpoint of the allies. The big movement at this time is apparently certain, and it is also forcing him to immobilize large bodies of troops.

In northwestern France, local operations enabled the British troops north of the River Somme to make progress and to establish posts east of Le Sars and in the direction of Butte de Warlencourt.

On the French section of the Somme front allied Grenadiers repulsed a German attack from the St. Pierre Vaast Wood salient, to the east of party debouching from the small wood northeast of Bouchavesnes.

In their offensive towards Vladimir-Volynski the Russians have gained further ground by entering the Teutonic lines and consolidating and of the successes.

The Italians report severe fighting in the Rhaetian Alps, northwest of Trent, on Cardinal and Busa Alta. These peaks are near the Swiss frontier and the Italians have been making a slow advance against the Austrians in an encircling movement on Trent.

The French troopship Gallia, a 15,100-ton steamer, has been sunk by a submarine in the Mediterranean. On board were 2000 men, and of these 1362 were saved, leaving about 638 missing.

Boston, Oct. 9.—Early today the submarine or submarines which sank six ships off Nantucket Shoals had not been identified, but there is no doubt in the minds of naval officers that with a small force of destruction.

The American steamer Kansas, which was held up by a submarine off Nantucket yesterday morning, arrived today. Her captain said that he had turned back in response to the signals of distress from the West Point but finding that his assistance was not required, he proceeded to Boston.

The most valuable vessel struck by the Germans was the passenger liner Stephano, which had just rounded the east end of Newfoundland when she fell a pray to a submarine.

NO DECORATIONS FOR MOVIE MAN

Altho in Taking Somme Pictures He Disregarded Shot and Shell.

HIS MACHINE HIT

But His Job Was to Turn the Handle, So He Kept It Going Round.

When the official motion pictures of "The Battle of the Somme," the greatest films yet produced, are presented at the Regent Theatre during the week of Monday, Oct. 16, under the auspices of The Toronto Daily World, there will probably be many in the hundreds of spectators who will give a thought now and then to the operator of the camera which recorded some of the graphic scenes.

You, who witness the exhibitions of the pictures, bear in mind the movie man. He himself does not figure in the films, but he volunteered to be your eyes there on the battlefield, when the British began their historic drive against the Germans, and as the films will be preserved for generations, he was also your children's and your children's children's eyes.

The pictures of the Somme battle cause speculation about the man who took them. He was so evidently intrepid that when he stood turning the handle of his machine in some places, did he really know what he was doing? Was he aware that he was really the eyes of the unborn, witnessing scenes for a world yet to come?

The movie man was invited for the sake of his health not to uncover his eyes before he heard the shriek of shells passing overhead. But the movie man was too keen about his job to care for anything but parapsychic things; and before the gun was fired, he was some sharp-eyed German.

The quality of his courage is a little unaccountable, for he behaved as if he would suppose he was unharmed by the doing more than recording a royal procession. He proceeds methodically, and calmly, as if he were in a room, and he keeps it going round.
