

# INSPECTORS NAMED BY LICENSE BOARD

Sixty Will Hold Positions  
Under Ontario Temperance Act.

## NO CHANGE IN CITY

In Some Cases a County is Basis of Inspectorial District.

The names of license inspectors appointed under the Ontario Temperance Act to enforce the provisions of that act, were announced by the license board yesterday, at least fifty of them were six or seven remain to be appointed.

There were over a hundred license inspectors under the old act which went out of force today. There are sixty under the new. These men have been picked almost entirely from the ranks of the old inspectors, but there are a few new names in the list. Under the old act there was practically an inspector for every riding except in the cities, such as Toronto, where there are ten seats and only three inspectors. Under the new act the county is made the basis of the inspectorial district, but in some cases more than one inspector has been appointed in one district.

No change had been made in the Toronto inspectors.

The appointments have been made by the government on the recommendation of the board after consultation with that body. The salaries range from \$200 a year to \$1800, there are an average of \$1200. They vary with the amount of work involved. The average, it is stated, is above the remuneration under the old act, in some cases the inspector has agreed to move his residence to a more central point.

# LORD BROOKE IS AMONG WOUNDED

He Has Been Commanding a Canadian Brigade at Front.

## A VETERAN SOLDIER

Lord Brooke Came to Canada Three Years Ago Under Exchange Plan.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Today's casualty list announces the wounding of Brigadier-General Lord Brooke, who is commanding one of the Canadian brigades at the front.

Brigadier-General Lord Brooke is the commanding officer of the 10th Brigade, C.E.F. He came to Canada in 1913 in connection with the interchange of British and Canadian officers in that year, and took command of the 2nd Mounted Brigade at Petawawa, Ont. In May last he was given command of the 10th or Ontario Infantry Brigade, and he has since been in command of the 10th or Ontario Infantry Brigade.

Lord Brooke is the only British officer with the Canadian Trench other than Lieut-General Sir Julian Byng.

# SPIRITUALIST, IN COURT, IS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Mrs. Stier, Hallam Street, Arrested on Charge of Telling Fortunes.

In the women's court yesterday, Martha Stier, 124 Hallam street, came up on a charge of "undertaking to tell fortunes by means of spiritualism."

As her counsel elected to be tried by jury, she was committed for trial.

Mrs. Stier was arrested about a week ago by the police, following information applied by the morality department. She was remanded for a week when she appeared in court at that time.

According to the police, the information which led to Mrs. Stier's arrest was obtained by Police Constable Levitt, another investigator of the morality department. Police Constable Levitt attended Mrs. Stier's home on two occasions, the first a public present, when about 24 persons were present, the second a private reading, secured by the investigators at the Stier's home was deemed sufficient to warrant her arrest.

# SOFIA WAS BOMBED.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Five bombs have been dropped on Sofia by two French aviators, Noel and Lencu, according to a despatch to Reuters from Bucharest. The two aviators flew over Sofia on their way. The voyage lasted five hours. The distance traversed was about 400 miles.

# ANOTHER ITALIAN RAID.

ROME, Sept. 14, via Paris, Sept. 15.—Eleven Italian sea planes, accompanied by several French aeroplanes, bombed batteries and sheds at Parenzo, thirty miles southwest of Trieste with good effect, according to an official statement issued today. The statement says the aircraft all returned intact to their bases.

# DANISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—The Danish steamer Hans Tausen, of 1,700 tons gross, has been sunk, according to a Lloyd's dispatch, by a submarine, probably a German, off the coast of Norway. The crew was landed.

# YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

TWO MOTORS COLLIDED BUT NOBODY WAS HURT

## Attempt to Pass on Twelve-Foot Roadway and Smash Ensues.

A motor car driven by Mrs. T. R. Wilson of McCaul street, Toronto, crashed into another car driven by Fred Gowland of Markham village on the highway between Unionville and Markham about 800 yards west of the Eckhardt bridge yesterday afternoon. Both of the cars were badly wrecked, but none of the occupants were seriously injured. Gowland was driving Miss Maclellan of Markham to the city intending to bring her father, who had been in the hospital for some time, back home. The road at the point where the accident occurred is very narrow, less than 12 feet in width.

# ENGINE HAULED FROM MUD, A TOTAL WRECK

Council Offers to Repair It, and Lend Another in Meantime.

William Goodyear of Unionville, whose traction engine went through the bridge over the River Rouge on Wednesday, succeeded in getting it out from the bed of the river, using another powerful tractor for the purpose. The machine is said to be practically destroyed by the action of the water on the boiler, and may not be reconstructed. Mr. Goodyear yesterday met the members of the Markham council in an effort to arrive at a settlement, but so far the council are unable to agree only to repair the engine, providing another in the meantime. The bridge was known to be unsafe, and Councilor Sumner felt two years ago submitted a resolution favoring the building of a new one which was voted down.

# CORTEGE AT EX-REEVE'S FUNERAL OVER MILE LONG

Late James Dinmá Laid to Rest in Markham Presbyterian Cemetery.

The funeral of the late James Dinmá, ex-Reeve of Markham Township, was held yesterday from his home on the 10th of Markham street, Markham, at 10 o'clock. It was one of the largest ever seen in the county, the cortege being over a mile long. The cortege consisted of a walk of life in Markham and Scarborough townships were present to bear tribute to the late Mr. Dinmá. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Gray, pastor of Zion Presbyterian Church, of which Mr. Dinmá was a member.

# BREWSTER'S SWEEP ALMOST COMPLETE

Only Six Conservatives Sure of Election in British Columbia.

PROHIBITION ASSURED

Majority Runs From Seven Thousand to Nine Thousand.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 15.—From returns received up to a late hour tonight at least six Conservatives were elected yesterday. Similkameen, Bulkley, Skeena, Fraser, and Columbia, and the Conservative majority in the house of commons.

All the cabinet ministers have been elected except Hon. W. R. Ross, and his election is expected. From the G.P.C. district he has a plurality of 60, with some places in Peace River yet to hear from.

George, Similkameen and Bulkley, Prince Rupert, Skeena and Fraser, and Columbia are safely Conservative. The soldiers' vote might turn the scale for the Conservatives in Delta and possibly in the Skeena and Bulkley districts. Two others, while under the Conservative opposition in the house of commons, were returned.

Until tonight it was thought that Captain W. W. Foster, Conservative, had been elected in the Islands constituency. Late returns, however, give the riding to the Liberal, with 317 votes, a majority of 39.

Prospective Cabinet.

Bowser will presumably hold office until the 15th of October. The political vote will be counted on Oct. 15. There is no reasonable chance, according to the figures available, of the present cabinet being re-elected. The Conservatives have a majority of 7,000 to 8,000.

From a semi-official source, the following cabinet slate for the Liberals is outlined:
