Soldier Settlement Loans

At Seventy Million Mark

Ottawa, July 9 .- Soldier settlement board loans passed the \$70,000,000 mark in June. Up to the 19th of the month there were 17,872 settlers' loans, amounting to \$70,555,434, approved. The loans were for the following purposes: Land purchase, \$38,-399,892, implements, \$7,849,386; stock and equipment, \$22,259,668; removal of encumbrances, \$2,046,488.


