

SHORTAGE OF COAL IN UNITED STATES HAS GRAVE ASPECT

Industrial Tie-Up on Extensive Scale Threatened for Next Winter.

PRODUCTION SHRINKS

Washington, June 18.—A coal shortage next winter, which may curtail production of iron and steel and seriously affect other industries, is foreseen by the United States Federal reserve board, in its report tonight of business, industrial and financial conditions for the month of May. The situation already is acute in some districts, according to the board, and production in many lines is being held down.

Production of coal is being curtailed as a result of shortage of cars, the reserve board reports. It estimated the car supply at the mines in the east at only 30 per cent. of normal. Labor difficulties, while complicating the situation, are reported by the board as only a partial cause of reduced coal production.

Efforts of shippers on the great lakes to facilitate improvement of coal by pooling their shipments are regarded by the board as only a partial remedy.

In the southwest, according to the review, many mines are operating at only two-thirds capacity. Coal shipments to other countries are reported as light. No reduction of coal prices is in sight, the board says.

Would Reduce Exports.

New York, June 18.—The American Gas Association announced here tonight that an appeal has been sent to Attorney-General Palmer to exercise the authority of this office "to bring about an immediate reduction in the volume of coal now being exported beyond the limits of the United States and its possessions."

WET ISSUE CAUSES POLITICIANS WORRY

Chicago, June 18.—A committee on resolutions, which was set up at the convention here, is carrying out the platform as it was being adopted at the convention here. MAN OF MILLIONS HELD FOR FRAUD

Chicago, June 18.—The estate of a man who died in the United States, Australia, Mexico, Spain, Canada and New Zealand, and that of the man who stipulated that the money was deposited, or in bank corporations the stock was held, in an interview with D. L. Sinclair, Mr. Kidd Byrne's attorney, last night. The World was given to understand that in order to get the bill executed in the estate it would have to be produced in several other places, and owing to a lack of ready cash Mr. Byrne had not been able to visit the various countries and conduct the proceedings. One condition of the will placed Mr. Byrne under an obligation to erect a memorial church in Toronto, and other religious buildings. Negotiations had been in progress for the carrying out of this condition, but it seems that no site was procurable. Another clause demanded that the clergyman change his name, which was Kidd, to Byrne.

The value of the estate is approximately \$9,100,000, of which \$1,500,000 was to be spent on the erection of a mission home in Toronto, for girls who had been unfortunate and were not leading moral lives.

FIRST TO WIN SCHOLARSHIP
Miss Alta Lind Cook, the Riverdale Collegiate Institute teacher, who won the Provincial scholarship of \$1,200, which will entitle her to one year's tuition in French in the Paris University, was the first in the province to win one of the five scholarships offered by the department of education.

The board has promised to make up the rest of her salary while abroad in recognition of her achievement.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY NOT FOR FARMERS

Housekeepers Also Excluded, View of National Council of Women.

St. John, N.B., June 18.—At the National Council of Women conference here this evening papers were read on various subjects and the remaining clauses of the women's platform taken up. These included uniform marriage laws, minimum wage for women and collective bargaining.

The eight-hour day was eliminated from the platform, it being felt that it was inapplicable to housekeepers and farmers. The platform was agreed to, it was also agreed that for the provincial platform, all legal disabilities should be removed from the children of unmarried parents. It was also resolved that there should be a closer co-operation with the Motherhood, and a complete supervision of young women emigrants from the time of embarkation to the time of their arrival at their destination.

A tonight's session Chief Justice McKeown addressed this conference and urged that women had equal representation with men in Canadianization work. The question of Canadianization was left for a committee of three to deal with and report to the council.
