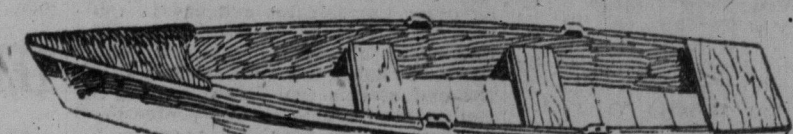

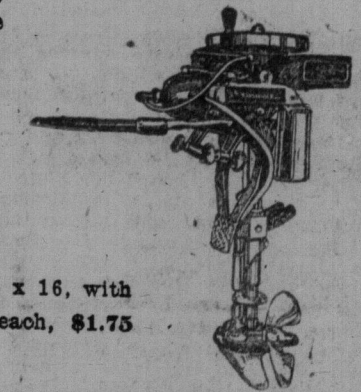

SOVIET REPUDIATES BIG PART OF DEBT

No Liability Admitted for
Debts Contracted Before
the New Regime.

London, June 15.—Soviet Russia does not recognize its liability for the debts contracted by the Czarist government, and has refused to be compelled to meet them will have vainly, it is said, says The Times in reporting negotiations between British ministers and Gregory Krassin, Russian Bolshevik minister for trade and commerce.

Mr. Krassin, when the matter was called for discussion, is said to have denied the existence of the debts, but intimated that, if the force of the circumstances should make it desirable for the Soviet Government to accept such liability, then the Soviet government would, as a counterbalancing factor, insist upon inheritance of the Czarist foreign debts due to Russia by former treaties.

He said, in especial emphasis, it is declared, on the anniversary of 1915, which awarded Constantinople to Russia.

In addition, the newspaper asserts, M. Krassin stipulated that if Soviet Russia were compelled to bear the burden of the debts, it would insist that debt charges incurred in overhauling the attacks of "white rebels," and in the attacks of "white rebels," be insofar as possible, be supported or supported by any foreign power.

BRITISH OBJECTIONS TO NEW U. S. MARINE BILL

Washington, June 15.—British objections to the enforcement of the new American merchant marine bill which Premier Lloyd George indicated in parliament yesterday as likely to be the subject of formal representations to the state department were understood to be based principally upon two sections of the measure.

The first of these prohibits the carrying of merchandise other than American ships between American ports via a foreign port. This would stop the carriage of freight between points in the United States and Canada over the Canadian railroad lines or in Canadian ships, which has grown into a business of magnitude.

The other section directs the president to terminate, as soon as that can be done under their terms, all treaties which restrict the right of the United States to impose discriminatory duties upon foreign shipping entering American ports.
