BERESFORD MAY  
BE A WITNESS  
Montreal, Sept. 1—It is possible that  
Admiral Lord Charles Beresford may have  
time not for pleasure but as a witness in  
the courts. As a result of an alleged in-  
terview with Lord Beresford, which ap-  
peared in the Montreal Witness and was  
later discredited, Lord Beresford declaring  
that he had given out no interview, this piece  
of news was characterized by the Herald  
as a fake.

Now the reporter who wrote the inter-  
view, John Bassett, of the Witness staff,  
is suing the Herald for \$5,000 damages for  
publishing or authorizing the publication of  
generally impugning his and the Witness's  
veracity. In entering the action, "reps  
have been taken to call Lord Beresford,  
his secretary, Hon. Dudley Carleton, and  
other prominent men as witnesses.

Toronto, Sept. 1—A Winnipeg despatch  
says the C. P. R. will extend their line  
into the Peace River country, building  
north from Edmonton.

#### SCORES MANITOBA FOR LACK OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE LAW

Winnipeg, Sept. 1—(Special)—The  
corner stone of a new school to supplement  
the Aberdeen school in the congested for-  
eign district of Winnipeg was laid today.  
Dr. Timmons, superintendent of the Lon-  
don county council schools, a delegate to  
the British Association for the Advance-  
ment of Science, gave an address. He  
superintends the largest number of schools  
and pupils in the world. He said he had  
just learned with surprise that Manitoba  
had no law rendering attendance at school  
compulsory. In a civilized country like  
Canada, the doctor failed to conceive any  
combination of circumstances which just-  
ified this. He vigorously declared that it  
was the birthright of every child to be  
given educational facilities, and when  
parents were unable to secure these,  
these, the state should see to it.

#### FEAR CREW OF THE HAVELOCK HAS BEEN LOST

Halifax, Sept. 1—The report comes  
of the loss of the three-masted schooner  
Havelock, of Annapolis, which was picked  
up at sea, bottom up, and towed into  
Port Nevis, Cuba. Many of the crew,  
who it is feared are all lost, hail from  
here.

A dispatch says the Havelock, which  
left Annapolis on July 25 for Savannah,  
loaded with lumber, has been found at  
sea, bottom up and the crew are missing.  
Her master was Captain Gildert, of Lun-  
enburg. The mate's name is Rafuse, also  
hailing from Lunenburg. The vessel is  
owned by the Frank Pickles Lumber Co.  
of Annapolis. Part of the cargo is re-  
ported to have been saved and the vessel is  
badly damaged and leaking.

The Havelock was built at Bridgetown  
in 1901 for the Pickles & Mills Lumber  
Company, but subsequently was sold to  
the Frank W. Pickles Lumber Company.  
She is 150 tons registered and carried a  
crew of eight men. The vessel and cargo  
were insured.

#### TRY CAPE BRETON MAN FOR ATTEMPT TO END HIS LIFE

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 1—Cape Breton is  
to have the novelty of a trial for at-  
tempted suicide.

Louis Mungrave, liquor license inspector  
of North Sydney, was yesterday commit-  
ted to the supreme court on the charge  
of attempted suicide. He is now in the  
county jail at Sydney, the magistrate  
refusing to accept bail.

The information was laid by the ac-  
cused man's sister-in-law. The arrest took  
place yesterday, the preliminary hearing  
occupying only a short time.

Mungrave, a few weeks ago, shot him-  
self in the head. He was thought to be  
recovered, though the bullet is still in his  
head.

#### COST MONTREAL MAN \$5,000 TO GET BUSINESS

Montreal, Sept. 1—It cost Roch Martin  
\$5,000 in losses and \$200 of this week  
to Chief Benoit, of the fire department,  
in order to do business selling horses to  
the city. This is what Martin declared  
before the royal commission this after-  
noon but the admissions only came from  
him after a lengthy examination during  
which the witness exhibited the uncer-  
tainty of memory which has been charac-  
teristic of this royal commission evi-  
dence.

He had once handed out \$500 to be dis-  
bursed among five aldermen but he could  
not remember their names. He only men-  
tioned Chief Benoit's name after being  
cornered by the lawyer.

#### BLIGHT SETTLES ON SPRINGHILL

Springhill, N. S., Sept. 1—Dullness like  
a perfect blight has settled down on this  
town. The U. M. W. in the fifth week  
of the miners' strike, will commence its  
relief payments to striking miners of the  
Cumberland Railway & Coal Company on  
Friday of next week. Orders on the mer-  
chants of the town will be made out at the  
rate of \$2 per week for each man, \$1 for a wife  
and fifty cents for each child. No cash  
will be paid. It is said this will  
average about \$2.50 for each family affected  
by the strike.

Some men have left the mining town,  
but a vast proportion of those who went  
on strike are still here.

The officials are keeping the pumps and  
fans going and eight of them are below  
what they can to preserve the mine in  
shape. But they are only a fraction  
of the force required for this purpose. The  
officials seem to like their work. It means  
double pay for them while it goes on. The  
men are settling to the prospect of the  
mines being shut down all winter and the  
possibility of their not reopening even in  
the spring.

Harvey L. Watkins, general manager of  
the Keith and Albee Nickel theatres and  
smaller vaudeville houses throughout New  
England and Canada, was in the city yes-  
terday on his tour of inspection. Mr.  
Watkins speaks very enthusiastically about  
the moving picture business and what the  
Lawson, Bangor, Portland and other
