HAZEL DAWN AND OWEN MOORE IN PICTURE

"Under Cover," at Opera House Proves Thrilling Feature—A Great Drama

"Under Cover," a great drama which scored an unprecedented success at the Cort Theatre, New York, and which was chosen by the Famous Players as an ideal vehicle for the first appearance of Hazel Dawn and Owen Moore as co-stars in their production, was presented at the Opera House yesterday.

"THE DESERTER," AT GEM STRIKING PICTURE

Charles Ray Seen in Powerful Indian War Drama and Famous DeWolf Hopper in Comedy

SPORT NEWS OF THE DAY HOME AND ABROAD

FOOTBALL

Harvard Wins Game

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 14.—Although many of its regular linemen and backs were not in the game, Harvard today scored three touchdowns and goals against North Carolina, and, with 21 points, nearly equaled the Princeton team in the day they recorded a blocked kick on the Crimson's 40-yard line. In neither case, however, were they able to gain.

The Southern's total ground from their scrimmage play today was only about 67 yards, while Harvard gained approximately 325 yards, of which 68 were the result of completion of four of the eight forward passes attempted. The passes were put on at opportune times, figuring in two of the touchdowns, and they were splendidly completed by the Crimson's two veteran runners, Haire and Charles Cooledge.

Princeton Trims Tufts

Princeton, N.J., Oct. 14.—Little Tufts, all swelled up with pride on account of the victory over Harvard a week ago, came to Old Nassau today with the idea of twisting the Tiger's tail in the gridiron battle that attracted a record crowd for an early season game to University Field. Nothing of the kind happened, however, for Princeton, under command of Speedy Rush, had been drilled into a state of preparedness for the trick plays of the Merford contingent and, putting a quick nip to the Tufts offensive, managed to score a field goal near the end of the last period and chalk up a victory by the score of 8 to 0.

There was no wild enthusiasm displayed by the 5,000 partisans of the home team at the victory achieved in the last five minutes of play. The margin was too small to denote any marked superiority on the part of the Princeton team, comparative scores, and it was generally recognized that Princeton had an advantage in meeting the tars from Tufts after the power of their attack had been disclosed in the game that humbled the Crimson warriors.

Shelvin Had Valuable Estate

Minnesota, Oct. 15.—The estate of the late Thomas L. Shelvin, millionaire lumberman and former Yale football star, is valued at \$2,180,675 in the report of the executors, who acted as appraisers of the estate, filed in the county court today. Hearing on an application for a final decree of distribution will be held early next month.

American Runners in Stockholm

Bob Simpson won the 110 metre hurdles in 14 8-10 seconds at the Stockholm meet yesterday, surpassing the Olympic record by one-fifth of a second. The American team won the 400 metre race in 48 5-10 seconds. In the 1,000 metres run, two Swedes, Zander and Bolin, equalled the world's record of 2 minutes 31 2-10 seconds. Ted Meredith was beaten by several seconds.
