

LAPOINTE SAYS CANADA SOLID FOR LIBERALS

Former Minister in King Government Speaks in Westmorland

MONTCTON, Sept. 8.—Declaring that Canada on September 14, would vote solidly for Liberalism, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice in the King administration, closed a whirlwind trip to this part of the Province when he addressed a meeting of the electors in the City Hall here tonight.

The hall was filled to capacity. Hon. Mr. Lapointe arrived here this morning and addressed a meeting of the electors of Kent County at St. Mary's in the afternoon.

R. M. Palmer, barrister of this city, presided at tonight's meeting and Senator C. W. Robinson was the first speaker. After expressing appreciation at Lapointe's visit, here this morning, he stated that H. R. Emmerson, the Liberal nominee in Westmorland, had not sought the nomination and that he was the safest man to vote for, was the man not seeking office.

MARITIME RIGHTS

The speaker continuing said all the promises made by the Liberals in 1921 had been fulfilled and he then turned to the question of Maritime Rights and the last general election. "The Maritime Rights Epidemic," Senator Robinson declared, "was like all other epidemics." It had affected the people's mentality so they were

unable to vote sanely. After the so-called Maritime Rights delegation had gone to Ottawa they forgot all about Maritime Rights. He continued and had become hard boiled Conservatives. These same members had voted against the Robb budget which was the most hopeful and most progressive ever presented to the people of Canada.

The ex-Minister of Justice was accorded a fine reception as he rose to speak. He recalled the time when he had spoken in Moncton in the interests of the late Hon. H. R. Emmerson, some years ago, and he was pleased to be here again to speak in support of a worthy son of a worthy sire.

Continuing Hon. Mr. Lapointe said he was trying to honor Sir Wilfrid Laurier's memory by following those principles which the late Liberal leader had laid down. It was not the business of Mr. Meighen or of Mr. King to decide the issues in this or any election, he declared it was up to the people themselves.
