BALDWIN POINTS OUT TRIUMPH FOR BRITISH DIPLOMACY

Refers to Locarno Treaty and Germany's Entry in League of Nations

SCARBOROUGH, Eng., Oct. 2.—Premier Baldwin, addressing a mass meeting tonight in connection with the Conservative Party conference, alluded to Germany's entry into the League of Nations and the ratification of the Locarno Pact as a signal triumph for British diplomacy and a great achievement on the part of Sir Austen Chamberlain.

The Prime Minister referred to the difficulties in China as on a fair way to solution. Then turning to the industrial troubles, he declared the general strike and coal strike were largely the inevitable result of tendencies which had appeared in Great Britain before the war.

TRADE UNIONS NEEDED. On the subject of the Trade Union law, Mr. Baldwin said that recent events made it necessary to re-examine the existing law. Collective bargaining was still a necessity to society, which needed trade unions.

DIFFICULTY TO SOLVE. "The difficulty we have to solve is to reconcile the rights of men in a community and the rights of the individual in full relation to the wider community. To the resolution you passed today the government will give prompt and careful consideration and as soon as we have completed our examination of the subject we shall present a bill and proceed with it in Parliament."

CUSTOMS ENQUIRY RESUMES OCT. 25. Commission Expected to Sit First at Toronto; to West Later

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—Sittings of the enlarged Royal Commission investigating the Customs Department will be resumed on Monday, Oct. 25. This was announced today by W. D. Ender, minister of customs. While the commission would sit first, information received here is that it will probably meet in Toronto. The sitting will be followed by others at border points in Ontario, and then the commission will likely go west.

MARPOLE ELECTED BY MONTREAL CLUB. MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—At a meeting of the Montreal English Rugby Club (M. A. A.), H. G. Marpole was elected captain for the present season in succession to F. L. Foss. He plays at right wing, three-quarter. The vice-captain is A. Stech, a former Halifax Wanderers forward.

PIONEER WILL BE NAMED. Burrows Who Went West in 1875 is Slated For Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba

WINNIPEG, Oct. 2.—Theodore A. Burrows, pioneer of Manitoba, who came west from Ottawa in 1875, is to be appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, succeeding Sir James Aikens according to a report received from Ottawa today. He is a former member of Parliament, having represented the constituency of Dauphin in the Federal house.

Venoi Against Any Pacific Cable Debate. OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—In the opinion of Hon. P. J. Venoi, postmaster-general, the Pacific cable dispute is not a matter which should be discussed at the Imperial Conference.

THORNTON BUSY ON VANCOUVER HOTEL

Consults Haynes Regarding Choice of Architects For Hostelry

MONTREAL, Oct. 7.—As a result of the recent correspondence between Sir Henry W. Thornton, K.B.E., chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, and J. P. Haynes, of Toronto, president of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada, bearing on the selection of architects in connection with the construction of the proposed Canadian National Hotel at Vancouver, a meeting was arranged and held today between Sir Henry and Mr. Haynes, who was accompanied by W. L. Somerville, treasurer of the Royal Architectural Institute. As this meeting Sir Henry explained that in the present situation it seemed natural that the best talent should be looked for in connection with this work and this was done in common with the practice of other large Canadian projects of a similar nature.

\$1,000,000 SURPLUS ON ROAD EXPECTED

TORONTO, Oct. 7.—Premier Ferguson, Ontario, today stated that business during the past year on the province's railway, the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario, had been so good that the surplus of \$1,000,000 from the road. The road had one of the best years in its history, according to Chairman George Lee, of the Commission, and had turned over \$8,000,000 worth of business over other railways.

\$60,000,000 PLANT ON DNEPR APPROVED

KIEV, Ukraine, Russia, Oct. 7.—The Ukrainian government today approved the plans of Hugh Cooper, United States engineer, for the construction of a \$60,000,000 hydro-electric plant on the Dnieper River.
